

RITES OF ORDINATION

After the Gospel, all stand to sing a hymn to the Holy Spirit Hymn CH 226

PRESENTATION OF THE BISHOPS-ELECT

After the hymn, the Principal Consecrator and the Consecrating Bishops, wearing their mitres, go to the seats prepared for the ordination and sit. The Bishops-elect are led by their assisting priests to the chair of the Principal Consecrator before whom they make a sign of reverence.

THE APOSTOLIC LETTER

One of the assisting Priests addresses the principal ordaining Bishop in these words:

Most Reverend Father, the Church of N. asks you to ordain these Priests N. to the responsibility of the Episcopate.

The principal ordaining Bishop questions him, saying:

Have you a mandate from the Apostolic See?

He replies:

We have.

Principal ordaining Bishop: Let it be read.

Then all sit and the document is read. The Papal Bull is shown to the Principal Consecrator, then all the other bishops and all the faithful. Everyone sits, while the document is read in Latin and English.





CONSENT OF THE PEOPLE

When the reading is finished, all give their assent to the election of the Bishops, saying:

All: Thanks be to God.

Homily: Most Rev. Gabriel Justice Yaw Anokye (Metropolitan Archbishop of Kumasi)

PROMISE OF THE BISHOPS-ELECT

Each of the Bishops-elect then rise and stand in front of the Principal Consecrator who questions them:

Archbishop: The ancient rule of the Holy Fathers decree that a Bishop-elect is to be questioned in the presence of the people on his resolve to uphold the faith and to discharge his duty. And so, dear brothers, do you resolve by the grace of the Holy Spirit to discharge until death the office entrusted to us by the Apostles, which we are about to pass on to you by the laying on of our hands?

Bishops-elect: I do.

Archbishop: Do you resolve to preach the Gospel of Christ with constancy and fidelity? **Bishops-elect:** I do.

Archbishop: Do you resolve to guard the deposit of faith, entire and incorrupt, as handed down by the Apostles and preserved in the Church everywhere and at all times? **Bishops-elect:** I do.

Archbishop: Do you resolve to build up the Body of Christ, his Church, and to remain in the unity of that Body together with the Order of Bishops under the authority of the successor of Saint Peter the Apostle?

Bishops-elect: I do.

Archbishop: Do you resolve to render obedience faithfully to the successor of the blessed Apostle Peter? **Bishops-elect:** I do.

Archbishop: Do you resolve to guide the holy people of God in the way of salvation as devoted fathers and sustain them with the help of your fellow ministers, the Priests and Deacons? **Bishops-elect:** I do.

Archbishop: Do you resolve, for the sake of the Lord's name, to be welcoming and merciful to the poor, to strangers, and to all who are in need? **Bishops-elect:** I do.

Archbishop: Do you resolve as good shepherds to seek out the sheep who stray and gather them into the Lord's fold?

Bishops-elect: I do.

Archbishop: Do you resolve to pray without ceasing to Almighty God for the holy people and to carry out the office of High Priest without reproach?

Bishops-elect: I do, with the help of God.

Archbishop: May God who has begun the good work in you bring it to fulfillment.

INVITATION TO PRAYER

LITANY OF SUPPLICATION

Then the Bishops put aside their mitres, and all rise. The Principal Ordaining Bishop standing, with hands joined, faces the people and invites them to pray:

Let us pray, dearly beloved,

that the loving kindness of Almighty God,

providing for the welfare of the Church,

will grant to this chosen one an abundance of his grace.

The Bishops-elect prostrate themselves as the rest stand at their places for the Litany of the Saints

Lord, have mercy, Lord, have mercy

Holy Mary, Mother of God, Pray for us.

Keep the Pope and all the clergy in faithful service to our church *Lord*, we ask you to hear our prayer.

Bring all people together in peace and true harmony, Lord, we ask you to hear our prayer.

Comfort with your mercy the troubled and the afflicted, Lord, we ask you to hear our prayer.

Strengthen all of us and keep us in your holy service, Lord, we ask you to hear our prayer.

Bless these chosen man, Lord we ask you to hear our prayer.

Bless and sanctify these chosen man, Lord, we ask you to hear our prayer.

Bless, sanctify, and consecrate this chosen man for his sacred duties, Lord, we ask you to hear

our prayer.

Jesus, Son of the living God, Lord, we ask you to hear our prayer. Christ, hear us, Christ, hear us Christ, graciously hear our prayer, Christ, graciously hear our prayer.

After the singing of the litany, the Principal Consecrating Bishop standing with hands outstretched sings or says:

Graciously hear our petitions, O Lord, and as you raise the horn of priestly grace over this your servant, pour out upon him the power of your blessing. Through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

LAYING ON OF HANDS AND PRAYER OF ORDINATION

The Bishops-elect rise, go to the principal ordaining Bishop, who is standing at his chair with the mitre on, and kneels before him.

The principal ordaining Bishop lays his hands upon the head of each of the Bishops-elect, without saying anything. Then all the Bishops, going to the Bishops-elect one after another, lay hands on them, without saying anything. After the laying on of hands, however, the Bishops remain alongside the principal ordaining Bishop until the end of the Prayer of Ordination, but in such a way that the action may be seen clearly by the faithful.

Then the principal ordaining Bishop receives the Book of the Gospels from one of the Deacons and places it, open, above the heads of the Bishops-elect; two Deacons, standing on the right and on the left of the Bishops-elect, hold the Book of the Gospels above their heads until the end of the Prayer of Ordination.

With the Bishops-elect kneeling before him, the principal ordaining Bishop, putting aside his mitre, and with the other ordaining Bishops, also without mitres, near him, with hands extended, sings or says the Prayer of Ordination:

God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, Father of mercies and God of all consolation, who dwell on high and look upon the lowly, who know all things before they come to be, who established order in your Church through your gracious word, who from the beginning predestined a righteous people born of Abraham, who instituted rulers and priests and did not leave your sanctuary without ministry, who from the beginning of the world

have been pleased to be glorified in those you have chosen: All the ordaining Bishops join in the following part of the Prayer, with hands

joined, but in a low voice, so that the principal ordaining Bishop's voice is heard clearly:

Now pour forth upon this chosen one the power that is from you,

the governing Spirit, whom you gave to your beloved Son Jesus Christ and whom he gave to the holy Apostles,

who established the Church in each place as your sanctuary, to the glory and unfailing praise of your name.

The principal ordaining Bishop continues alone:

Grant, O Father, knower of all hearts,

that this your servant whom you have chosen for the Episcopate may nourish your holy flock

and may without reproach exercise before you the High Priesthood,

serving you night and day;

that he may unceasingly cause your face to shine upon us and offer the gifts of your holy Church.

Grant that by the strength of the Spirit of the High Priesthood

he may have authority to forgive sins according to your command;

that he may apportion offices according to your precept

and loosen every bond according to the authority you gave the Apostles;

may he be pleasing to you in meekness and purity of heart,

offering a sweet fragrance to you

through your Son Jesus Christ,

through whom glory and power and honor are yours,

with the Holy Spirit in the holy Church

both now and for ever and ever.

All: Amen.

After the Prayer of Ordination, the Deacons remove the Book of the Gospels which they have been holding above the head of the newly ordained Bishops and one of them holds the book until it is handed to the newly ordained Bishops.

All sit.

The principal ordaining Bishop and the other ordaining Bishops put on their mitres.

ANOINTING OF THE HEAD AND HANDING ON OF THE BOOK OF THE GOSPEL AND THE INSIGNIA

The principal ordaining Bishop puts on a linen gremial, takes a vessel with Sacred Chrism from one of the Deacons, and anoints the head of each of the newly ordained Bishops, who kneels before him, saying:

May God, who has made you a sharer in the High Priesthood of Christ, himself pour out upon you the oil of mystical anointing and make you fruitful with an abundance of spiritual blessing.

Then the principal ordaining Bishop washes his hands.

PRESENTATION OF THE BOOK OF THE GOSPELS

Taking the Book of the Gospels from a Deacon, the principal ordaining Bishop presents it to each of the newly ordained Bishops, saying:

Receive the Gospel, and preach the word of God with all patience and sound teaching.

Afterwards, the Deacon takes the Book of the Gospels and returns it to its place.

INVESTITURE WITH RING

The principal ordaining Bishop places the ring on the ring finger of the right hand of each of the newly ordained Bishops, saying:

Receive this ring, the seal of fidelity: and adorned with undefiled faith, preserve unblemished the Bride of God, the holy Church.

INVESTITURE WITH MITRE AND PASTORAL STAFF

Then the principal ordaining Bishop places the mitre on the newly ordained Bishops, saying:
Receive the mitre, and let the splendor of holiness shine in you, so that when the chief
Shepherd appears you may merit to receive an unfading crown of glory.

Lastly, he presents the pastoral staff to the newly ordained Bishops, saying:

Receive the crosier, the sign of the pastoral office, and keep watch over the whole flock in which the Holy Spirit has placed you as Bishops to govern the Church of God.

All rise.

FRATERNAL KISS FROM THE BISHOPS' CONFERENCE & OTHER BISHOPS

The newly ordained Bishops are invited by the principal ordaining Bishop to be seated in the first place among the concelebrating Bishops.

Then, after setting aside their pastoral staff, the newly ordained Bishops rise and receive the fraternal kiss from the principal ordaining Bishop and all the other Bishops.

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE CATHOLIC ARCHDIOCESE OF ACCRA



"I rejoiced when I heard them say, 'Let us go to the house of the Lord'. And now our feet are standing within your gates, O Jerusalem!" (Ps. 122: 1-2)



Most great things have humble beginnings. Such is the history of the Metropolitan Catholic Archdiocese of Accra. On 31st January, 1893, Fathers Otto Hilberer and Eugene Raess arrived in the Gold Coast - Accra to found Catholicism in then budding city which was to become the Nation's capital in later years. Rev. Frs. Otto Hilberer and Eugene Raes of the Society of African Missions (SMA) celebrated the first recorded Holy Mass

in the Accra Mission, as it was called, for the small Catholic community on 31st January, 1893 in the house of Chief John Quartey situated on today's High Street about the location of today's CFAO. In the same year, the first Catholic Baptism in Accra took place as it was administered to Louis James Buckle on 25th May, and on 12th August, 1894, the first recorded Holy Matrimony was celebrated between Herbert Cheetam and Rose Mary Quaye.

In 1894, a devastating yellow fever epidemic swept through the coastal towns of Ghana, then Gold Coast, and dealt a great blow to both the local people and the missionary priests. In all 7 out of 10 SMA Missionaries in the Elmina-Accra died as a result of this epidemic. Soon, the Accra Mission was without a pastor. It was as if Satan himself was waging war against the establishment of the Kingdom of God in Accra. For about 30 years, Accra was to remain without a resident priest. The Accra Catholic community was left in the care of a lay Church committee led by Messrs. Brown Andoh and Yankah and others. These held the fort and were visited from time to time by SMA Missionaries from Elmina and Cape Coast until Rev. Fr. Joseph Stauffer was posted to Accra in 1924 and he purchased an old cocoa shed situated on the Derby Avenue, which he later refurbished into a Church that was to become the Sacred Heart Catholic Mission. Thus, the Sacred Heart Church, located in the very heart of then Accra and also within the indigenous people of the land, became the the premier and mother Church of Accra, mother of all Churches of the Accra Church. Before then, Church services in Accra were held in rented houses. Among the many houses used for worship were those of one Miss Quaye and Mr. Andoh. On 23rd May, 1925, the remodelled church which was now serving as the only Church was dedicated by Bishop Hauger, SMA. The solemn High Mass by a Bishop on that day was the first ever recorded Episcopal Mass celebrated in the Accra Mission.

For more than forty years, the SMA Fathers continued to minister actively as the principal clerical pastoral agents to the Accra mission until gradually they handed over to the Society of the Divine Word Missionaries (SVD). In the Acts of the Apostles Chapter 16, St. Paul had a vision of a Macedonian who urged him in these words: "Come across to Macedonia and help us." That was the way in which the Holy Spirit inspired the early Christian Church to launch its missionary apostolate to Asia Minor and Europe. The call for the SVD to come to the Gold Coast was materialized in 1938 when the pioneering missionaries of the Accra mission, the SMA's, offically sought help for its missionary works in the Gold Coast. At that time they

were so overwhelmed with the task of the missions that they were unable to develop the other areas surrounding the city of Accra. It was evident that Accra would become the centre of government, of business, of industry and indeed of the faith. At that time, in the whole area that later became the Accra Diocese, there were only two residential mission stations. Evangelization had only started in the Akim and Kwahu Districts, and the Church had hardly impacted the Krobo and the Afram Plains.

From The Accra Mission Church to a Particular Church

In Code of Canon Law of the Catholic Church, a particular Church is an ecclesial community headed by a Bishop or someone recognised as the equivalent of a Bishop. There are two kinds of particular Churches: Local particular Churches and Autonomous ("sui iuris") particular Churches (these are aggregations of local particular Churches that share a specific liturgical, theological and canonical tradition. They are called "particular Churches or rites". The largest of such autonomous particular Church is the Latin Rite. The others are referred to collectively as the Eastern Catholic Churches an example with the accra precinct is the Maronite rite Church located at Osu RE). The Accra mission falls under the designation of a local particular Church, one in which and from which the one and only Catholic Church exists in a concrete way in this part of the world. For most people, a diocese is the most familiar form of such local particular Churches, but there are other forms, including that of a territorial abbacy, an Apostolic Vicariate and an Apostolic Prefecture. Unless the contrary is determined, these other forms of local particular Churches are equivalent to a Diocese in terms of administration. The Accra mission as we know it today as the Catholic Archdiocese of Accra evolved under the SVDs as a particular Church from being elevated to a Vicariate, Prefecture, Diocese and now an Archdiocese. Over the years, many other missionaries have joined the SVDs and SMAs to serve as pastoral agents of Accra. These clerical and lay pastoral agents are now strongly today maintained by the heavy Diocesan Clergy (145 Diocesan Priests) and one female local religious congregation (ie the Handmaids of the Divine Redeemer, HDR).

Accra Under Bishop Noser



From 1938, Father Adolf Noser was selected by the Superior General of the SVD to be the first Superior of the Accra mission. But the Doctor who examined him declared him unfit for life in the tropics. The Superior General suggested: "Find another Doctor." The second Doctor too considered him unfit. So a third one was consulted who finally did agree to his going to Africa. One Doctor is said to have observed: "I give him 6 months," but as history proved, he was wrong. Fr. Noser became an indefatigable missionary in the Gold Coast-Accra along with Rev. Fr. John Dauphine SVD, the first African-American Priest from the USA. Fr. Noser was both a very spiritual man and a rugged missionary and under his leadership, the Accra Mission made phenomenal advances. He himself became the model of the so-called "bush missionary" on trek facing unflinchingly the hardships of travelling and living in the more primitive conditions which prevailed in the Gold Coast of that time. During his 15 years of being the Mission Superior and later on as Bishop, the Accra Mission made truly astounding progress.

On 2nd December, 1943, the Holy Father elevated the Accra mission then know as the Vicariate Apostolic of Costa d'Oro (Gold Coast) into the Prefecture Apostolic of Accra and Fr. Noser become the Prefect Apostolic of Accra from 1944 to 1947. On 12th June 1947, he was named and consecrated first Bishop of Accra when the then particular church, the Prefecture Apostolic of Accra was now elevated into the Vicariate Apostolic of Accra. He was the Bishop Accra for only 6 years.

Under his tenure, on 18th April, 1950, the Vicariate Apostolic of Accra was elevated to the Diocese of Accra. On 8th February, 1953, he blessed and laid the cornerstone of the Holy Spirit Cathedral of today. In the same year, 1953, Bishop Noser was transferred to Papua New Guinea as Archbishop of Alexishafen and Rev. Fr. Joseph Oliver Bowers, SVD, an African-Caribbean from the Commonwealth of Dominica, succeeded him as the first black Bishop of the Gold Coast colony. When Bishop Noser left the Gold Coast in 1953, there were 14 residential stations, 227 outstations, 35,000 Catholics, 177 schools and 775 teachers.

Accra Under Bishop Bowers



When Bishop Bowers took over from Bishop Noser we can say that the strong skeleton of the Church in the Gold Coast was in place. It would be Bishop Bowers' task to put the flesh and blood on those bones — which he did most admirably. Bishop Bowers brought the Dominican Sisters of the Diocese of Speyer into the Mission and they built up hospitals in Battor and Akwatia and established the Girls' Secondary School in Akwatia. In 1957, Bishop Bowers founded the Diocesan Congregation of the Handmaids of the Divine Redeemer (notice the closeness of the name to the Divine Word). The Congregation grew up rapidly and is flourishing.

In the educational field, several top rate Secondary Schools were established. Pope John Secondary School was started as a Minor Seminary for the training of Diocesan Priesthoods. The Catechists were given special attention and a Diocesan Catechetical School

was started at Asamankese. Most Parishes and Outstations grew and multiplied as also did the Catholic Youth Organization and other pious associations of the lay-faithful. Looking back now, it is difficult to even imagine how one man could be shepherding that vast area of the Church which is now the Archdiocese of Accra, the Diocese of Koforidua and the Vicariate Apostolic of Donkorkrom. On 5th January, 1957, Bishop Oliver Bowers completed the Holy Spirit Cathedral and declared it open for public worship. This was followed by a thanksgiving Mass on 6th March, 1957 to mark the Independence Day of Ghana. Under Bishop Bowers, Accra Diocese celebrated its Diamond Jubilee. Then on 16th January, 1971, Bishop Bowers was appointed the first Bishop of St. John's Basseterre in the West Indies.

Accra Under Bishop Andoh




In 1971, Bishop Bowers was transferred to the West Indies, and was succeeded in the same year by the first Ghanaian Bishop in the person of Most Rev. Dominic Kodwo Andoh DD, JCD. The history of the Accra Diocese under Most Rev. Dominic K. Andoh is a story of remarkable growth and development. On 3rd October, 1971, Bishop Andoh was consecrated in the Holy Spirit Cathedral as the first Ghanaian Bishop of Accra by Archbishop John Kodwo Amissah of Cape Coast. He went on to oversee a number of key events and milestones that helped shape the future of the Diocese. One of the highlights of Bishop Andoh's tenure was the Solemn dedication of the Holy Spirit Cathedral on 2nd June, 1974. This event was presided over by Bishop Andoh, assisted by Bishops Joseph O. Bowers and Francis A. K. Lodonu. This was a significant moment in the history of the Accra Diocese, as it marked the

completion of the Cathedral, which had been under construction for several years, though it was opened to public use.

The visit of Pope John Paul II to Accra on 8th May, 1980 was a key event during his tenure. The Pope arrived in Accra to begin a three-day Papal visit to Ghana, which culminated in his blessing of the National Catholic Secretariat of Ghana, known as the Centenary House in Accra. This visit was particularly significant as it came during the Centenary celebrations of the Catholic Church in Ghana. In August 1992, Bishop Andoh launched the year-long Centenary Celebration of the Catholic Church in Accra, under the theme: 'Shine in the world' (Phil: 2: 15-16). During this celebration, the Catholic Diocese of Koforidua was carved out of Accra by Pope John Paul II. Accra was elevated to a Metropolitan See, and Bishop Andoh became the first Metropolitan Archbishop. Very Rev. Fr. Charles Gabriel Palmer-Buckle of Accra Diocese, then Chaplain of Achimota School, was nominated Bishop-elect for the newly created Koforidua Diocese. On 29th June, 1993, Archbishop Andoh received the Sacred Pallium of Office as Metropolitan Archbishop in Rome from the hands of Pope John Paul II. He was then enthroned as the first Metropolitan Archbishop of Accra on 25th July 1993, by Most Rev. Abraham Katumana, the then Apostolic Nuncio to Ghana, Togo, and Benin. The First Synod of the Catholic Archdiocese was convoked by Archbishop Dominic Andoh from December 1996 to January 1997. It was held at the St. Paul's Catholic Seminary at Sowutuom, under the theme "Renewal of the Evangelization in the Archdiocese of Accra". The synod concluded with the publication of an outcome under the theme "Challenges and Hopes for the new Millennium". He retired in 2005 and was succeeded by Most Rev. Charles G. Palmer-Buckle, the pioneer Bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Koforidua, The following year, Donkorkrom was carved from Koforidua Diocese and became an Apostolic Prefecture with Fr. Gabriel Edoe Kumordji, SVD, as the Apostolic Prefect.

Accra Under Archbishop Palmer-Buckle



The appointment of Archbishop Charles Gabriel Palmer-Buckle as the Metropolitan Archbishop of Accra in 2005 ushered in a new era for the Catholic Archdiocese of Accra. In June 2005, Archbishop Palmer-Buckle received the Sacred Pallium from Pope Benedict XVI in Rome, Italy. A few months later, he took canonical possession of the Metropolitan See of Accra. Two major innovation made in the early years of his tenure was first the convocation of the second Diocesan Synod. In August 2008, the Second Synod of the Catholic Archdiocese of Accra was convoked at the Holy Spirit Cathedral in Adabraka, Accra. The Second Synod was successfully celebrated in February 2009 at the St. Paul's Seminary, Sowutuom under the theme, "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations baptizing them ... teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you." This was in preparation for the Archdiocese's 125th anniversary. The

second milestone was to accept the Catholic Institute of Business and Technology in Tantra Hills, Accra, to the Catholic Archdiocese of Accra in 2008 as property of the Accra after the Ghana Catholic Bishops' Conference ceded the management of the University. In 2011, the campus was relocated to the Social Advance Institute.

In July 2012, the 120th Anniversary of the Catholic Archdiocese of Accra was launched at the Holy Spirit Cathedral with the theme: "The Accra Catholic Mission: Honoring the Past, Celebrating the Present, Building the Future". The slogan was "Arise Catholic faithful! Rejoice and Renew" and the climax was celebrated in 2013.

Sadly, during Archbishop Palmer-Buckle's tenure, the Catholic Archdiocese of Accra also saw the passing into eternity of two of its former Bishops. The first was Bishop Oliver Bowers (Emeritus of Saint John's-Basseterre), who had just celebrated his 100th birthday in March 2009. He passed away in November 2012. The second was Archbishop Emeritus Dominic Andoh who died in May 2013 at the Korle-Bu Teaching Hospital in Accra, two weeks after his 84th birthday. Despite these great losses, there were also reasons for celebration during Archbishop Palmer-Buckle's tenure. In August 2013, 23 Priests were ordained for the SMA, SVD, Spiritans, and Comboni religious Congregations working within the Archdiocese of Accra. Additionally, in November 2013, a thanksgiving Mass was held at the Independence Square to mark the end of the Year of Faith and the official preparation for the 125th Anniversary of the Accra Catholic Mission. The climax of the anniversary was graced by the then President of the Republic of Ghana, H.E. John Dramani Mahama at the Indepence Square, Osu. On 11th May, 2018, he was transferrred to the premiere Archdiocese of Ghana, the Cape Coast Archdiocese where he is currently serving as its Metropolitan Archbishop.



Accra Under Archbishop Kwofie



On 2nd January, 2019, Bishop John Bonaventure Kwofie of Sekondi-Takoradi was nominated the Archbishop of Accra and on 1st March, he took canonical possession of the Metropolitan See of Accra. He led the Church bravely in the COVID-19 era and gave hope to the Church. No wonder, in 2021, he launched the Legacy of Hope Project which has the plans of mobilizing funds to commence the construction of a Modern Children's Hospital. When the governance of the Archdiocese became huge on his shoulders, he appealed to Rome for support. Then on 14th February, 2023, the Holy Father responded to his request by nominating two great sons of the Archdiocese as Auxilary Bishops. Thus, following the announcement, history was made in the annals of the Church in Accra and Ghana as two Auxilary Bishops were named simultaneously. This is the 2nd time the Accra Church is witnessing the presence of Auxiliaries and we

are all proud to be part of this history making.

The Metropolitan Archdiocese of Accra is today the gateway to the beautiful country of Ghana. Thus, on Wednesday 19th April, 2023, a new gate of history was opened in the Archdiocese as the clergy, laity and people of all walks of life gather at the Holy Spirit Cathedral to witness the Episcopal Ordination of Msgr. Anthony Narh Asare and Msgr. John Kobina Louis.

TITULAR SEES

If a Bishop is not the Ordinary of a Diocese (e.g. an Auxiliary Bishop of a Diocese or a Vicar Apostolic), he is a Titular Bishop. Each Titular Bishop is therefore assigned by the Holy See to a Titular See. Each Diocese has a see city (or cities) that give the Diocese its name. Over the course of history, See cities are transferred to other cities, especially as populations shift and demographics in a given diocese change. Some Diocesan sees are the victims of historical circumstances such as enemy invasion of Christian lands. Those Bishops who were exiled retained the "title" of their old Diocese, part of their own title of office. In Asia Minor and North Africa, many Dioceses became defunct over them when they became schismatic, or when they were swept by other religions, or when they disappeared simply because the importance of the cities declined. A Titular See can also be created when the Apostolic See suppress a Diocese when the number of Catholics in the Diocese has declined sharply.

But, as it goes, Dioceses that relocate Sees aren't totally defunct; they technically are "suppressed." There seems to be an in-built hope that the Christian population of that particular defunct see will return and find its status restored as a see city once again. that of Titular Bishop. They have no jurisdiction over their titular dioceses, but enjoy, with few exceptions, the privileges and honours of residential (diocesan) Bishops. Bishops who are assigned to a Titular Metropolitan See or Titular Archiepiscopal See are Titular Archiepiscops.

In the Catholic Church's understanding of the office of Bishop, it is important for a Bishop to be attached to the People of God in a given place, even if they don't live there. So when bishops are ordained for a purpose other than serving as the diocesan bishop, they are given the title of one of these "supressed" see cities — properly known as titular sees.

The newly elected Axulilary Bishops of Accra therefore have their Titular Sees. Their significantly, both Titular Sees were historical Dioceses in the Roman Empire in the Province of Numidia , nowadays associated with Henchir-Gastal in northern Algeria. Bishop-elect Anthony Narh Asare is the 7th Titular Bishop of Castellum in Numidia. The See of Castellum in Numidia was established in 1933 as Titular See (Diocese) in, Algeria. Castellum in Numidia (Latin: Castellanus in Numidia). Bishop-elect John Kobina Louis is the Titular Bishop of Fesseë. The titular see was established in 1533 and he is the 27th Bishop of the Titular See.

WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN AN ARCHBISHOP AND AN AUXILIARY BISHOP?



Sacramentally speaking, there is no difference. Both Archbishops and Auxillary Bishops are called and consecrated to the fullness of the priesthood of Jesus Christ. Thus, there is no difference in the ordination of an Auxiliary Bishop, Diocesan Bishop, archbishop and even a Cardinal. Indeed, the Pope himself is not "ordained" a Pope. He, too, is a Bishop, in fact, the Bishop of Rome.

But since Archbishop John B. Kwofie, the Metropolitan Archbishop of Accra, has requested the Holy Father for the assistance of two Auxiliary Bishops, who have been duly nominated and consecrated into the episcopate, it's worth exploring what Canon Law has to say about the distinction between different "types" of Bishops.

All Bishops, as successors to the Apostles, possess the same charism, dignity and sacramental authority as members of the Church's magisterium. While the Pope, by virtue of his office, enjoys some special rights and privileges inherent to his unique role as successor to St. Peter, the difference between other Bishops lies at the ecclesial — or Church — level and is largely the subject of Canon Law.

While the Pope has full, supreme and universal power and jurisdiction over the whole Catholic Church, a Diocesan Bishop or Archbishop — often called an "ordinary" — has administrative power and jurisdiction over a smaller portion of the Church, which is his Diocese. Archbishop John Kwofie hence is or remains the ordinary or the proper administrative head of the Archdiocese of Accra who now has two Auxilliaries as his first collaborators.

The difference between an Auxiliary Bishop and the Diocesan Bishop of the same Diocese is in the governing rights of the particular church. The Diocesan Bishop as the ordinary of the Diocese exercises ordinary powers. Ordinary power or jurisdiction is one which is committed to a particular office by law in such a way that anyone who occupies the office automatically possesses that authority. Ordinary jurisdiction is held in canon law to be the jurisdiction "permanently and irremovably annexed to" the office of the diocesan bishop. It is said to be "proper" if it is exercised in one's own name, e.g. the Bishop of the diocese; it is "vicarious" if it is exercised in the name of diocesan bishop. So, for example in each Diocese, the Vicar General, Auxiliary Bishop or Coadjutor Bishop exercise ordinary vicarious jurisdiction. They act not in their own name but in the name of the Diocesan Bishop.

Auxiliary Bishops, while technically they are also Diocesan Bishops in their own right, i.e. in with regard to their "titular sees", they exercise their sacramental authority and vicarious governance ordinary powers with the permission of and in harmony with the local ordinary. An Auxiliary Bishop, unlike a Coadjutor Bishop, does not automatically hold the right of succession should the ordinary Bishop resign or die.

Normally, the title "Archbishop" refers to the Diocesan Bishop of a Metropolitan Archdiocese, but this isn't always the case. The Pope may grant the honorary title of "Archbishop" to Bishops serving in Vatican Curial Offices or in diplomatic posts. Thus, if for example an Apostolic Nuncio, who is an Archbishop, is named Auxilary Bishop to a diocese, he will retain his Archbishop title (Auxilary Archbishop) even though he would not be in charge of a Diocese or an Archdiocese. Although it is rare for an Archbishop to later serve as an auxiliary bishop, it is not unprecedented, such as in the case of a Vatican official returning to Diocesan ministry.

So, what do Auxiliary Bishops do?

A Bishop's threefold office as priest, prophet and king — and their corresponding duties of sanctifying, teaching and governing the faithful — mean a Bishop is chiefly responsible for offering the sacraments, preaching the Gospel as a witness to the truth of Christ and exhorting and leading the faithful of their diocese by their words and example.

None will deny the challenges faced by today's Diocesan Bishops. These include the size of the Dioceses they govern, the number of the faithful they must serve, the complex ethnic composition of many dioceses, etc. As a result, when a bishop feels he requires assistance in his duties, he may ask the Holy See to appoint an auxiliary to lend a hand in the administration of certain diocesan affairs. The Auxiliary is appointed not with the mind of succeeding diocesan bishop but rather to assist the Diocesan Bishop in meeting the pastoral and administrative needs of the diocese.

However, when a Bishop must serve on national or international committees, tasks requiring significant time away from his Diocese, or when advanced age or poor health interfere with his efficiently exercising his office, the Holy See may appoint a Coadjutor Bishop to assist the Diocesan Bishop like the Auxiliary Bishop. One big difference between a Coadjutor and an Auxiliary is that the Coadjutor enjoys the right to assume leadership of the Diocese when the presiding Bishop dies or resigns his office. In the ranking of Diocesan Episcopal officials, the Bishop enjoys the highest status, and a Coadjutor the next, followed by any Auxiliary Bishops and then the Emeriti Bishops.

Since Auxiliaries are nominated upon the request of the Diocesan Bishop, their roles may differ depending on the Diocesa and the Diocesan Bishop, but in general, Auxiliary Bishops may assist with confirmations, baptisms, ordinations and special Masses, or even in the regional governance of a particular part of the Diocese. In the Catholic Archdiocese of Accra, the Archbishop may call on the newly elected Auxiliary Bishops to serve as moderators with pastoral responsibilities of some selected Deaneries of the Archdiocese to ensure pastoral efficiency, as well as serve in various roles within the Archdiocesan Curia.

Titular Auxiliary Bishop is not bound:

- ▶ to make visit ad limina Apostolorum (some say he is);
- to be in residence in his titular see, or in the Cathedral city of the Diocese in which he holds the office of Auxiliary (the place of his residence is regulated by the diocesan Bishop);
- ▶ to say Mass "for the people."

Auxiliary bishops may be appointed by the Holy See with or without special faculties. Because they should share in a special way with the Diocesan Bishop, the general pastoral governance of the Diocese, an Auxiliary Bishop who is appointed by the Holy See with special faculties is given special consideration in the law and is to be made a vicar general by the Diocesan Bishop. Auxiliary Bishops without special faculties also may be made vicar generals or episcopal vicars.

Diocesan Bishops are to consult in collaborative fashion with their Auxiliary Bishops in matters of major importance. Auxiliaries, on the other hand, are called to perform their duties with solicitude and in a spirit of harmony and unity with the Diocesan Bishop.

Auxiliary Bishops have the right and duty to participate in Ecumenical Councils with a deliberative vote. They must be called to particular councils where they also have a deliberative vote. Auxiliaries belong to the Conference of Bishops and have a consultative vote or deliberative vote depending upon the statutes of the Conference. Auxiliaries, however, may not serve as presidents of a Conference of Bishops.

Like Diocesan Bishops, Auxiliary Bishops are obliged to reside in the Diocese to which they are appointed. They are not to be absent from the Diocese except for brief periods of time and an annual vacation not exceeding a month.

An Auxiliary Bishops are asked to submit to the supreme pontiff their resignation at age 75 or sooner when they are unable to attend to their duties due to illness or some other grave cause. Their retirement does not become effective until it is accepted by the supreme pontiff. After retirement, the Diocese they serve has the primary obligation for their support and they are known as emeriti Auxiliary Bishops of only the last diocese that they served as auxiliaries.



APPOINTMENT AS AUXILIARY BISHOP

On Tuesday, 14th February, 2023, the feast of the two saintly brothers, St. Cyril and St. Methodius, the Apostolic Nuncio to Ghana, the Most Rev. Henryk M. Jagodzinski, announced at the Holy Spirit Cathedral, Adabraka, that the Holy Father, Pope Francis, had appointed two Auxiliary Bishops for the Archdiocese of Accra. The appointees were Rev. Fr. John Kobina Louis and Rev. Fr. Anthony Narh Asare. The latter has been assigned the Titular See of Castelloin Numidia, an ancient Diocese which was located in present-day Algeria.

BIRTH AND BAPTISM

Msgr. Anthony Narh is the fifth born of eight children to Mr. Lawrence Ebenezer Asare-Kwao and Mrs. Helen Teiko Asare-Kwao Kwao (née, Opata; deceased on Friday, 7th August, 2020). He was born on 29th December, 1965 at the St. Martin de Porres Clinic at Agormanya OdumaseKrobo in the Eastern Region of Ghana.

He was baptised by Rev. Fr. G. Wilson, SVD on 16th January, 1966 at the Holy Trinity Catholic Church at Agormanya.

BASIC EDUCATION, FIRST COMMUNION AND CONFIRMATION

Msgr. Asare began his primary education at the Tema Community 2 No. 4 Basic School and proceeded to the Star Kindergarten and Primary School at Tema Community 5. His family worshipped at the Good Shepherd Parish, Tema Community 2 where he received his first Holy Communion on 8th April, 1973 in the hands of Rev. Fr. H. Janssen, SVD. He received the Sacrament of Confirmation on 5th May, 1973 administered by then Rt. Rev. Dominic KodwoAndoh, Bishop of Accra Diocese.

SECONDARY EDUCATION

He had his secondary education at the Tema Secondary School from 1978 to 1983 where he successfully obtained his GCE O' level and his A' level at the Labone Secondary School in Accra from 1983 to 1985.

THE CALL

His call to the Ministry came in diverse ways. First as a National Service Teacher, then as an Insurance Officer working with the Marketing Department of the Great African Insurance Company. He was also dealing with Catechumens as a part-time Catechist with the Sisters Servants of the Holy Spirit (SSpS) in the Parish on various apostolates and finally through interactions with young energetic Priests who worked in the Parish.

SEMINARY FORMATION

He began his Seminary formation at the Sowutuom Philosophy Campus in September 1988. He joined the second batch of pioneers to begin the Spirituality programme introduced to Seminary formation in Ghana. Having spent a year of Spirituality formation and two years of philosophical training, he proceeded to the St. Peter's Seminary in Pedu, Cape Coast in 1991 to continue his four-year Theological education. In 1993, he obtained his Diploma in Theology at the University of Ghana, Legon.

He was ordained a Priest on 22nd July, 1995 for the Clergy of Accra by Archbishop Dominic Kodwo Andoh at the St. Joseph the Worker Parish at Tema Community 8.

PASTORAL MINISTRY

As part of his pastoral works and experiences, from 1995 to 1997, he was the Assistant Priest of Martyrs of Uganda Catholic Church at Mambrobi; Priest-in-charge of Sacred Heart Parish at Derby Avenue from 1997 to 1999; Priest-in-charge of St. Peter's Parish, Osu from 1999 to 2004 and Priest-in-charge of St. Maroun Ghanaian Community, now St. James the Elder Catholic Church, Osu, Accra from 2004 to 2008.

He was the Parish Chaplain of St. Andrews Catholic Church, Westland Row, Dublin in Ireland from 2008 to 2012; Pastoral Assistant at the Mary Mother of Good Counsel, Airports West in 2013; Parish Priest of St. Joseph the Worker Parish at Community 8, Tema from 2013 to 2019; Parish Priest of Ss. Anne and Joachim Catholic Church and Director of Priest Personnel, Accra Archdiocese from 2019 to the date of his appointment as Auxiliary Bishop.

APOSTOLATES

Between 1995 and 1997, he was Chaplain of St. Mary's Secondary School at Korle Gonno as well as Spiritual Director of the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary (FMM) Centre of Hope. From 1996 to 1997, he served as the Spiritual Director for the Daughters of Mary Mother of Mercy (DMMM) Catholic Press Community. Between 1997 and 1999, he was the Spiritual Director of the Religious of the Virgin Mary (RVM) Wala Hamo Project; Board Chair of the Catholic Action for Street Children (CAS) from 1997 to 2008.

From 2002 to 2006, he was a member of the Board of Directors of Accra Catholic Press, Accra; 2002 to 2008, he served as the Accra Archdiocesan Financial Administrator/Director of Pontifical Mission Societies/Secretary to the Archdiocesan Development Committee; from 2013 to 2019, he was the Spiritual Director for the Missionaries of Charity Sisters, Tema; Notre Dame L'Eglise (NDE) Sisters from Togo; and the Congregation of Holy Family Sisters, Kordiabe.

He was a Part-time Lecturer at the Department of Religious Studies and Church Administration at the Catholic Institute of Business and Technology (CIBT), Accra from 2019 to 2021 while from 2018 to 2021, he served as a member of the Governing Council of CIBT.

From 2022 to the date of his appointment as Auxiliary Bishop, he was a member Governing Board of the Christ the King International School, Cantonments.

POST-SEMINARY STUDIES

In November 1995, he obtained a Certificate in Management Skills from the Price Waterhouse Associates, Human Resources Development Unit, Legon, Accra and a Certificate in Financial Management from the Management Development and Productivity Institute, Accra, Ghana in 2002.

In same 2002, he obtained Certificates in Financial Accounting, Budgeting Control, Financial Accounting for non-finance Managers, Office Management and Administration, Effective Administrative Skills and Internal Auditing, all from the Management Development and Productivity Institute, Accra, Ghana.

He holds Degrees and Certificates including, MA in Management from the Dublin City University (DCU) in Ireland from 2008 to 2009; MA in Leadership and Pastoral Care from DCU from 2009 to 2010; Masters in Supervisory Practice (MASP) at DCU from 2010 to 2012.

In 2012, he obtained Certificates in Reflective Ministry, Project Management and Public Relations at the All Hallows' University, Ireland.

CONCLUSION

Anthony chose for his priestly motto excerpts of an ancient Christian hymn namely "A charge to keep I have, a God to Glorify and to serve the present age my calling to fulfill". This has been his guiding principle in ministry. He relies on the Holy Spirit informed by the message of the Cross. He also, with the help of the maternal intercession of Our Mother Mary and the cooperation of the people of God in the Archdiocese of Accra, the fraternity of the Presbyterium, the assistance of his twin Auxiliary Bishop Louis, will collaborate with our Chief Shepherd Most Rev. John Bonaventure Kwofie CSSp in making Accra Archdiocese a family of God.

THE MEANING OF THE COAT OF ARMS OF BISHOP ANTHONY NARH ASARE



THE GENERAL COLOURS

The colour GREEN reminds us of youthfulness, fresh or new ideas and readiness to serve. The yellow gold represents royalty whiles the colour white reminds us of purity, truth to humanity, reverence and communion with God.

THE CROSS AND DOVE

In the top left quadrant, the cross and the dove represent the victory of Christ and the Holy Spirit. Jesus' crucifixion gives us the assurance of salvation and God's victory over death. The Holy Spirit represents the presence of God in all aspects of our Christian journey.

Christ and the Holy Spirit have been and shall continue to be my guide and the firm rock on which my ministry is built.

M & A SYMBOL

The top right quadrant seen as the symbol M and A in blue colour represents our mother Mary and her intercessory presence in my ministry.

Blue colour which is always used for our dear Mother Mary tell us about humility, calmness and trust.

THE ANTS AND THE SEA

The bottom left quadrant seen as the ants and the wavy lines of the coast stand for the Ga-Dangme ethnic group and the coastal city of Accra where our Archdiocese is located. The red colour used for the ants tells you and I about our energy and life-giving blood. It also reminds us about leadership while the black colour reminds us of our strength and how unique we are as individuals.

THE EAGLE

The bottom right quadrant has the eagle which is called Korley in Krobo and is part of the symbol of the Jebiam clan of Krobo.

The vision of the Eagle reaches far and reminds us of the need to look forward to the future with hopeful anticipation and faith in God. The Eagle represents honesty, truth, strength and courage and we are called to emulate these virtues.

AD GLORIAM DEI is Latin for 'To the Glory of God"





APPOINTMENT AS AUXILIARY BISHOP

On Tuesday, 14th February, 2023, the feast of the two saintly brothers, St. Cyril and St. Methodius, the Apostolic Nuncio to Ghana, the Most Rev. Henryk M. Jagodzinski, announced at the Holy Spirit Cathedral, Adabraka, that the Holy Father, Pope Francis, has appointed two Auxiliary Bishops for the Archdiocese of Accra. The appointees were Rev. Fr. John Kobina Louis and Rev. Fr. Anthony Narh Asare. The former has been assigned the Titular See of Fesseiin Numidia, an ancient Diocese which was located in present-day Algeria.

BIRTH AND BAPTISM

John Kobina Louis is the second born of Mr. Vincent Louis and Mrs. Catherine Esi Dede Louis (née, Mensah; deceased on 26th September, 2015). He was born on Tuesday, 24th November, 1964, in Accra and baptized on 3rd January, 1965 at the Holy Spirit Cathedral by the late Very Rev. Fr. Charles Schneider, SVD.

BASIC EDUCATION, FIRST COMMUNION AND CONFIRMATION

In the 1969/1970 academic year, John attended King's Royal School, Nima, for his pre-school education. He, then, proceeded to the Nima Roman Catholic School for his basic education from 1970 to 1978. Together with his parents and siblings, he belonged to St. Kizito Parish, where he received his First Holy Communion and was confirmed by the then Bishop of Accra, Rt. Rev. Dominic Andoh.

SECONDARY EDUCATION

In 1978, John passed his Common Entrance Examination and gained admission to St. Augustine's College (AUGUSCO) in Cape Coast. While in AUGUSCO, he aspired to pursue the BSc. Civil Engineering Programme at the Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology (Kumasi), so that he could work with his father who was a contractor. In line with this aspiration, John read Science at AUGUSCO. Mathematics, Additional Mathematics and Physics were his favourite subjects. As a student of AUGUSCO, he successfully passed the General Certificate of Education (GCE) Ordinary Level and Advanced Level Examinations in 1983 and 1985 respectively.

THE CALL TO PRIESTLY SERVICE

In God's infinite goodness and providence, He calls Priests, Religious Brothers and Sisters even before their births (cf. Jer. 1:4-5). In the course of time, then, God uses diverse ways to draw their attention to His calling. Thus, it was not until his last year in AUGUSCO that John's attention was drawn to the call to the priesthood. This is how it all started. John had gone to visit his friend, Johnson Detty, but met his absence. While waiting for him, the latter's mother, Mrs. Georgina Detty, engaged John in a conversation. Having mentioned her observations about John, she asked whether he wanted to become a Priest. "No, Mummy!" was his immediate response. She then told him to think and pray about the matter. This was to be the beginning of two years (1984 – 1986) of reflection and prayers to discern whether God was calling him or not.

Subsequently, John consulted his Parish Priest, Msgr. Alex Bobby-Benson as well as his College Chaplain, the late Msgr. Gabriel Mensah, in his process of discerning God's call. Upon the completion of his studies at AUGUSCO, he was advised by his Parish Priest to do his national service while the discernment process continued. He did his national service at the Laboratory Unit of the then Ghana Water and Sewerage Corporation (now Ghana Water Company), at Mile 4, Accra, from September 1985 to August, 1986. In the course of the national service, he finally decided to go the seminary to pursue the formation and training of priests.

SEMINARY FORMATION, STUDIES AND ORDINATIONS

He was admitted to the St. Peter's Seminary, Pedu, Cape Coast in September, 1986. While in the third year in the Seminary, he and some of his mates were enrolled as the first batch of students to pursue the BA in Religious Studies and Sociology Programme at the University of Ghana, Legon. He obtained his BA (Legon) in 1991 and completed his priestly formation and training at the St. Peter's Seminary in June, 1992.

On 11th July, 1991, John and five other candidates of the then Accra Diocese were ordained as Deacons by the then Rt. Rev. Dominic Andoh at the Holy Family Catholic Church, Mataheko. The same Bishop ordained them as Priests on 18th July, 1992 at the St. Mary Catholic Church, Asamankese. As the guiding Biblical text for his priestly life and ministry John chose 1 Cor. 9:16, 27. He paraphrased it as follows: Lord, I could not resist your call to preach the Gospel. May I, therefore, discipline myself, lest after preaching to others, I myself be disqualified.

PASTORAL MINISTRY AND TEACHING APOSTOLATE

From 1992 to 1995, he was the Assistant Priest of Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Church, Tema Community 1 and was responsible for the outstations: St. Joseph the Worker Catholic Church, Tema Community 8; St. Peter's Church, Tema New Town; and St. Michael's Church, Michael Camp.

For the same period from 1992 to 1995, he was the Archdiocesan Chaplain of the Sea Apostolate in Tema and Youth Chaplain of the Tema-Battor Deanery. From 1995 to 2002, he was the Priest-in-Charge and Parish Priest, St. Joseph the Worker Church, Tema Community 8 (Outstations: All Saints Church, Community 11, Tema; St. John Church, Prampram; and St. Dominic Church, Dawhenya)

From 1996 to 2002, he was the Financial Administrator of Accra Archdiocese and the Director, Archdiocesan Pontifical Mission Societies, Accra; from 1997 to 2002, Director, Archdiocesan Pastoral Centre, Accra; 1998 to 2002 and 2016 to 2020, he served as the Spiritual Director, Handmaids of the Divine Redeemer Sisters, Christ the King and Generalate Communities.

He was an Associate Cathedral Administrator, Holy Spirit Cathedral, Accra from 2004 to 2006with Outstations: Immaculate Conception Church, Akweteman; St. Joseph the Worker Church, Weija; and St. Peter Church, Tettegu and from 2006 to 2012, he was the Administrator of the Holy Spirit Cathedral, Accra.

From 2008 to 2014, he was a part-time lecturer at the Department of Religious Studies and Church Administration at Catholic Institute of Business and Technology (CIBT), Accra; 2014 to 2020, Full-time Lecturer and Academic Dean, CIBT; 2014 to 2023, Pastoral Assistant at the Mary Mother of Good Counsel Church, Airport West Area and from 2017 to 2018, Acting President of CIBT. From July to November 2021, he was Priest-in-Charge, St. Jude Catholic Church, New Weija. From 2019 to his appointment as Auxiliary Bishop, he was the Vicar General, Accra Archdiocese.

COUNCILS. BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND ASSOCIATIONS

Msgr. Louis has also served in various capacities on Councils, Boards, Committees and Associations in the Archdiocese and elsewhere.

From 1996 to 2002, he was a member of the Board of Directors, Accra Catholic Press, Accra; 1996 to 2002, Financial Secretary, National Union of Ghana Diocesan Priests' Associations; and 1997 to 2002, 2006-Present, member, Council of Priests, Accra.

From 1997 to 2002, 2006 to 2014, 2019-Present, he has been a member of the College of Consultors, Accra; 2003 to 2004, President of the Ecclesiastical Union of Ghanaian Students in Rome; 2005 to 2010, member of the Board of Directors, Millennium Guest House Ltd (Holy Spirit Cathedral)

He was Chairman of the Archdiocesan Catechetical Commission, Accra from 2006 to 2010; President, National Union of Ghana Diocesan Priests' Associations from 2007 to 2011; Member & Chairman (2017-18), Academic Board, CIBT, 2010 to 2020; Chairman, Congregation Planning Committee, CIBT from 2014 to 2020.

Between 2015 and 2018, Msgr. Louis served as Chairman, Graduate Programme Management Committee, CIBT; 2015 to 2020, Chairman, Faculty Board & Examination Committee, CIBT; and from 2015 to 2020, Member & Chairman (2017-18), Management Committee, CIBT. From 2016 to 2020, he was the President of the Society of Catholic Social Scientists (Ghana Chapter); 2017 to 2018, Chairman, Academic Quality Assurance Committee, CIBT and from 2017 to 2020, Member, Governing Council, CIBT.

POST-SEMINARY STUDIES


Besides his participation In the Ongoing Formation Programmes for Priests of the Accra Archdiocese, Msgr. Louis pursued further studies. From October, 2010 to June, 2014, he did his PhD in Study of Religions (with thesis in the field of Ecclesiology) at University of Ghana, Legon. From September, 2002 to June, 2004, he had his Licentiate in Dogmatic Theology (STL), from the Pontificia Universitas Urbaniana, Rome. From April, 1996 to May, 1996, he pursued a Certificate Course in Financial Management and Budgeting, at the Ghana Institute of Management and Public Administration (GIMPA), Accra.

CONCLUDING WORD

In pastoral ministry, Msgr. Louis' special interests are in preaching and the teaching of Catholic doctrines. Finally, he wishes that all will remember him in their prayers, so that, always remaining in Christ like a fruitful branch on the vine (cf. John 15:5), he will, together with Most Rev. Asare, faithfully fulfill the task of assisting the Archbishop of Accra, the Most Rev. John Bonaventure Kwofie, CSSp.



THE MEANING OF THE COAT OF ARMS OF BISHOP JOHN KOBINA LOUIS



The general design of the coat of arms of bishops consists of a cross, a crest and a hat with a connecting rope which has six tassels on either side of the crest. Then, the specifics of a particular bishop's coat of arms are his motto as well as the divisions of his crest and the symbols therein.

MOTTO: MANETE IN CHRISTO

The scriptural inspiration for my life and ministry as an auxiliary bishop is John 15:1-7, which is about the "Vine and the Branches". This, therefore, is the basis for the choice of my motto and the specific symbols in the crest.

Our Lord Jesus Christ exhorts us: "Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing" (John 15:4-5). Obviously, it is only by abiding in the crucified and risen Christ as He abides in me that I can bear spiritual fruits in my life and ministry. Hence, the motto, "Abide in Christ", which is rendered in Latin as, "Manete in Christo".

So, this motto is intended to always remind me to abide evermore in Christ, who is the author and perfector of our faith (cf. Heb. 12:2), as well as the unique source and sustainer of our life (cf. John 1:3-4; 10:10b; 14:6) and ministry (cf. Rev. 1:5-6).

LEFT HALF OF THE CREST

The left half of the crest depicts a vine and a fruitful branch. While praying to constantly abide in Christ, the True and Eternal Vine, I invite you all to likewise remain in Him, so that we can always bear spiritual fruits in abundance – to the glory of God!

TOP PART OF THE RIGHT HALF OF THE CREST

The top part of the right half of the crest shows the Word of God and the presence of the Holy Spirit, symbolized by the white dove. Firstly, the opened book refers to the study of the Word and its proclamation. Secondly, the white rays around the dove represent the inspiration of the Holy Spirit which is required for the authentic study and proclamation of the Word.

It is by abiding in Christ as He abides in me that I can truly experience the inspiration of the Holy Spirit to faithfully and fruitfully study and proclaim the Good News of salvation.

BOTTOM PART OF THE RIGHT HALF OF THE CREST

In the bottom part of the right half of the crest is the host and chalice, with some golden rays which signify that the species have been consecrated. While this primarily symbolizes the Holy Eucharist, it represents the ministry of sanctification which entails the administration of the seven sacraments. The choice of the Holy Eucharist to represent all the sacraments is based on the fact that it is the Most Blessed Sacrament or the Sacrament of all the sacraments.

As I abide in Christ, the Eternal High Priest, may my ministry of sanctification of souls abound in spiritual fruits.

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

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
