SIR KNIGHT BRO. SIR ERNEST AMOAKO-AR HEN

EARLY LIFE

ir Ernest Kwabena Amoako-Arhen was born in Tarkwa, a gold mining town in the Western Region (Ghana) on Tuesday 16th November 1954 to Mr. Joseph Kwabena Amoako Arhen and Madam Elizabeth Adwoa Ankapong (Obaapanin Kwanowaa), Adontenhemaa of the Agona Clan of Adansi Akrofuom. His mother was a trader, whilst his father, Opanyin Amoako Arhen, was a renowned Goldsmith in Tarkwa and was a member of the Ekona clan of Adansi Akrofuom.

Kwabena was the only son, the 6th of seven children born to her mother and was fortunate to have had other step-brothers. His birth was greeted with great joy and enthusiasm, as his mother believed it was an answer to her long days of prayer for a male child.

Kwabena's intellect was very obvious as a young boy. At eight (8) years, he was exposed to reading at Holy Mass. He loved reading and became a collector of books and magazines. He created his own personal library, stocked with his favourite novels and would later lend to his friends. These novels helped to whet his reading culture.

He loved music and was a good singer. His father (a member of the Parish council) arranged for him to join the St. Matthew's Parish choir in Tarkwa as a young lad. He was a delight to watch during Mass; so cute leading the Choir in a procession. The Choir Master was very fond of him and went further to give him some piano lessons. Because of his sweet nature, people around him took a good liking to him. From age ten, Ernest served Mass regularly as an altar boy till he left Tarkwa.

EDUCATION AND CAREER

Ernest, as was called in school started his basic education at Akrofuom at age four and was later transferred to Catholic Boys' School Tarkwa for his primary and middle school education. He continued to Fiaseman Secondary School in Tarkwa (formerly known as Royal Secondary Commercial School) in 1968 where he obtained his General Certificate of Education, Ordinary Level. Thereafter, Ernest continued at Kumasi Polytechnic and graduated with a Diploma in Business Studies and concurrently completed his GCE A Levels in 1976.

After these studies he took up a teaching appointment at Ghana Secondary School, Tamale (now, Ghana Senior High School) to teach Accounting and Economics at the behest of Alhaji Fuseini, the erstwhile Headmaster of Ghana Secondary School (Ghanasco) in 1976.

Mr Amoako-Arhen, enjoyed his teaching opportunity in Tamale and would always reference that period as the most impactful

period in his professional career. Given that, some of his students made major strides in the world of business and politics and served our nation Ghana and beyond. Typical examples include but not limited to the likes of His Excellency Mr John Dramani Mahama (former President of Ghana) and his wife Mrs Lordina Mahama (former first lady), former Ghana Black Starts Captain and Champions League winner Abedi Ayew (Abedi Pele), Hon. Dr Ibrahim Mohammed Awal (Minister for Tourism), Dr Abdulai Alhassan (Ag. Director General, Ghana Civil Aviation), Prof. Awudu (Switzerland), Dr Mohammed Idris (Attorney General's Department, USA), Mr John Kasta (UK), Chief Alhassan Andani (former CEO, Stanbic Bank), etc. Ernest often recalled his experience in Tamale with nostalgia.

Ernest transferred to Kumasi High Secondary School during the 1979/80 academic year, taught for a year and travelled to Nigeria to take up teaching appointment at Ebenezer Baptist High School, Ile-Ife. With his thirst for knowledge, Ernest, did not feel accomplished and enrolled at the University of Ile Ife Business School for a degree in Accounting and Economics. In 1982 He settled at Ijero-Ekiti, at Ekiti State in Nigeria and got employed at Doherty Memorial Grammar School, where he taught Accounting, Commerce and Economics. He also tutored (part-time) final-year students on business administration and financial management at the Government Technical College in Ekiti. With hard work and persistence, he engaged himself with research and academic writing and published books and handouts on economics,

accounting and financial management, which helped to ensure a consistent stream of income. Having been an Examiner for WAEC since 1976, he knew how to teach students to maximize their chances of making good grades at their final examinations.



Ernest believed in the saying that "Life is a journey, not a destination" and so he returned to Ghana with his young family in August 1985 and secured a job with the United Africa Company (UAC) as a Departmental Supervisor at Kumasi, Adum Branch. He worked for some months and joined Lava Limited, initially at the Kumasi Outlet, where he later assumed the post of an Accountant at the Head Office in Accra. Ernest rose through the ranks and became the Financial Controller and managed all the company financial transactions across the country. He worked with Lava for twenty-six productive years.

Ernest was naturally creative and undaunted by change; thus, in 2008 he felt the need to try something different, which resulted in venturing into consultancy services with private enterprises and organisations, and provided expertise and strategic advice on financial analysis, financial management, tax preparations, audit compliance and entrepreneurship. He joined Asmona Construction Limited in 2010 and worked with the company as a General Manager for thirteen years until his sudden demise.

Mr Arhen kept abreast with developments in his field and regularly upgraded himself. His desire to advance in his intellectual capacity took him to Ghana Institute of Management and Public Administration (GIMPA) where he studied for the Executive Masters in Leadership and Governance and graduated in 2009. He had an extraordinary work ethics; he was hardworking, thorough and meticulous with incredible core values of integrity and commitment. Ernest believed that; "The greatness of a man is not in how much wealth he acquires but in his integrity and his ability to affect those around him positively". Sir Ernest Amoako-Arhen always challenged himself by setting high standards with a strong commitment to any undertaking.

FAMILY LIFE

Sir Knight Amoako-Arhen was a gentleman by all standards, a self-made man with a sweet and calm disposition. His lifestyle was simple and promoted reconciliation and peace around and about him. He was a family man to the core, sacrificing personal comfort most times, for the growth and peace of his family.



Kwabena met his darling wife Vivian Afua Asantewaa Akani in 1981, a sweet, industrious lady with a good sense of humour. Vivian's affable nature endeared her to Ernest's family members. The traditional marriage ceremony was duly performed followed by the Civil Ordinance which took place at Obuasi District Court. Vivian subsequently joined her sweetheart in Nigeria (Ekiti) in 1982. Their Holy Matrimony taking place some years later in Ghana. The marriage was blessed with three children - Nana Arhen (Derek), Ohemaa Akua Kwanowaa (Phyllis) and Paa Kwesi (Ernest Inr). Mr Amoako-Arhen was a good father, always considerate of the wellbeing of his family, an incredible man with a big heart. He established bond with his nephews and nieces, and raised some of them like his biological children. He was an available father who was there whenever they needed him, encouraged and inspired



them through education, social life and helped to build their spiritual life through the catholic doctrine. He was strict but very gentle; he never failed to discipline them when they veered off the right path. His mentorship and sense of humour was unparalleled.

To his wife Mrs Vivian Amoako Arhen (née Akani) he was a backbone and great moral support. He reinforced her business drives and created an environment where both collaborated in the growth of the family. Obviously, to the extended family, Ernest was the pillar, and he will be deeply missed by the entire Agona (Anona) Abusua.

CHRISTIAN LIFE – A STAUNCH CATHOLIC; THE SERVING SERVANT

Sir Ernest Amoako Arhen was born into the Catholic faith. His maternal great grandfather Nana Asare was one of the founding members of the Church in Akrofuom. He was baptised at St. Matthew Church, Tarkwa when he was nine months old and received his first holy communion at age seven. In January 1965 he received the sacrament of confirmation in the same St. Matthew Catholic Church.

Sir Ernest keenly practised his Catholic faith in the different places he resided. When he returned from Nigeria and finally settled with his family in Accra, he registered and worshipped at the Holy Spirit Catholic Cathedral, Accra. It was in this Cathedral that Ernest and Vivian received their nuptial blessing in the sacrament of Holy Matrimony on 1st June 1991. He was very active in the Parish and contributed his quota in building the Church of God. Mr Amoako-Arhen loved his Catholic faith and sought to know, understand and appreciate it more deeply through reading the Church's documents, the Catholic Digest and Standard, catholic websites, attending retreats and recollections.

His active participation at the Holy Spirit Cathedral Parish earned him various positions of service.

- He served as a Youth Coordinator of the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) from 2001 to 2002
- Became the Public Relations Officer (PRO) of the Cathedral Parish Council (PPC) in 2002 until 2004.
- From 2005 to 2008 (4 years) Sir Ernest served on the same Parish leadership Council as the Vice Chairman.
- He was elected and sworn in as the Chairman of the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) for a two-term mandate of four years, from 2009 to 2012. He was patron to both the Holy Spirit Cathedral Parish Main Choir and the Youth Choir until

his death. He also doubled as the patron of the St Augustine and St. Theresa of the Child Jesus Societies. He committed himself to these choirs, and societies, including supporting and sponsoring their activities.

Mr Amoako-Arhen extended similar assistance to his home Parish, St. Luke Catholic Church, Adansi Akrofuom. Sir Ernest lived St James' exhortation in James 2:17; and backed his faith with good deeds and supported parishes in different ways. For instance, he donated full compliments of Choir Robes to the Cathedral Choir and presented his home parish choir with full set of Catholic Hymnals; it was his way of encouraging them to sing and chant English hymns and psalms.

During the celebration of the Millennium Holy Year in 2000, Sir Ernest was made a member of the Millennium House Complex Project Committee of the Catholic Archdiocese of Accra. He also chaired the Fund-Raising Committee for the Millennium Project, and many attested to his immense output. On the completion of the Millennium House Complex, Sir Knight was designated by Archbishop Dominic Andoh (RIP) and his team of consultors to serve as a member on the Board of Trustees. During the Year-long Golden Jubilee celebration of Holy Spirit Cathedral (2004-2005) in Accra, a 10-member Committee was inaugurated to spearhead the activities marking the Jubilee. Sir Ernest Amoako-Arhen served as the chairman for the Jubilee Planning Committee.

SIR KNIGHT ERNEST AMOAKO-ARHEN AND THE NOBLE ORDER

Another avenue through which Mr Ernest Amoako-Arhen served the church was his membership with the Knights and Ladies of Marshal. He was initiated into the Knights and Ladies of Marshal fraternity on 11th April 1992. He rose quickly through the ranks to become Secretary to the Council. He embodied the values governing the group and served unreservedly. Sir Knight took his responsibilities

and membership of the Knights of Marshal very seriously and passionately; he totally lived for the fraternity.

When the Accra Central Council 74 was created, he was elected as the first Grand Knight and served from 2000 to 2002. Having recognised his sterling qualities Sir Knight Amoako-Arhen was appointed as Supreme Auditor of the Noble Order from 2005-2007. Again, his career as finance expert made him stand tall to be appointed as Supreme Secretary of Finance in 2009. He was subsequently elected as the Deputy Supreme Knight in 2013 and ultimately installed as the 31st Supreme Knight of the Knights of Marshal from 2015 to 2017. During his tenure in these offices Sir Knight Amoako-Arhen served diligently and was very committed to the cause of the Order. He rose through the ranks and became a substantive Supreme Knight.



In 2019, Sir Knight Ernest Amoako Arhen was elected to the Council of the International Alliance of Catholic Knights (IACK) as the Deputy President; a position he held until his demise in March 2023. IACK is made up of Catholic Knights in different countries and continents – including the United States of America, United Kingdom, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, Ghana, Nigeria, Gambia, South Africa, Pakistan, Austria, Belgium, Mauritius and others.

Sir Knight Amoako Arhen had a deep devotion to St. Joseph and became an unalloyed devotee of Our Lady, the Mother of God. In his bid to appreciate God's presence and the intercessory power of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Sir Ernest, in consultation with his family decided to build a Grotto at his home parish, St. Luke Catholic Church, Adansi Akrofuom in memory of his Mum and Dad. Ernest declared, "We should build a Grotto of the Blessed Virgin Mary in thanksgiving to God, because he has been good to us, as a family in so many ways".

CONFERMENT OF PAPAL AWARD

Sir Knight Ernest Amoako-Arhen having distinguished himself in all humility of character, reputation and service was honoured by the Holy Father with Papal Knight Award of the Order of Saint Gregory the Great (KSGG). The Awards ceremony commenced on Saturday, 12th August 2022 at Our Lady of Mercy (OLAM) Catholic Church, Community One, Tema. On Saturday December 10, 2022 the official ceremonial rites for the conferment of the Papal Awards, investiture and the presentation of insignia was officiated by His Excellency, Most Rev. Henryk M. Jagodzinski, Apostolic Nuncio to Ghana with Most Rev. John Bonaventure Kwofie, CSSP; Metropolitan Catholic Archbishop of Accra.

We are grateful to God who found his servant worthy, and granted him such honour. To God be the Glory



SOCIAL LIFE

Ernest was sociable and humble in so many ways and was easily identified with a consistent smile. He loved spending time with his friends and truly enjoyed church picnics and social events and parties. He also enjoyed family gatherings of both his nuclear and extended family coming together for celebrations. Ernest was a big sports fan and was an obsessive footballer as a youth. He never missed watching national and international football matches and scrutinised every game like a sports analyst would.

Ernest loved to dance and enjoyed good music. He liked classical and country music in particular; Kenny Rogers and Bob Marley were some of his favourites. He also took pleasure in travelling, which he called "exposure and learning time." By the grace of God, he fulfilled this passion and travelled around the globe a bit, to countries such as Nigeria, Togo, the Republic of Benin, Liberia, Sierra Leone, Burkina Faso, Ivory Coast, England, Wales, Scotland, Australia, Europe and the United States of America.

Sir Knight was a kind and unselfish father, friend, brother, uncle and grandpa to many people. He motivated and inspired people; a man of his values, and quite passionate about social justice. He was an awesome team leader who would go to any extent for the well-being of his team. Generosity was one of his hallmarks, not only with his resources but more so with his time, ideas and talents. Many a time when people approached Sir Knight to discuss issues, he gave his all; time and energy as if the person was the only one who mattered. He had time for people and respected the dignity of each person.

Sir Ernest quietly built a reputation for himself as a great philanthropist, interested especially in the education of the poor, needy and brilliant students. He instituted 'Kwanowaa Education Fund' for the youth, especially those in Akrofuom. The fund is in honour of her Mum, Obaahemaa Kwanowaa, (Elizabeth Ankapong) who never had the opportunity of formal

education but always encouraged and supported her children to study harder. He also funded scholarships, invested in Fiaseman Secondary School (his alma mater), donated financial support and offered regular stipend to some tertiary students in the Holy Spirit Cathedral Parish. Sir Knight Amoako-Arhen will be fondly missed by some of our elderly priests in various residences whom he supported with donations and regular visits. The development of Akrofuom township was very dear to his heart and one of those who facilitated the formation of the Association of Akrofuom Mpontuo kuo in Ghana and abroad. Ernest was very instrumental in the electrification of Adansi Akrofuom.

DEMISE

On the 8th of February 2023, Ernest complained of feeling unwell. He had started experiencing unusual severe back pains. This eventually affected his breathing and level of energy, making him very uncomfortable and feeling weak. On the 4th of March 2023 he reported to his doctor and was admitted at the Korle-bu teaching Hospital for thorough assessment. Sir Ernest made a significant progress towards full recovery and was hopeful of being discharged the following day. However, his creator whom he loved and served so faithfully, called him to eternal rest on Monday, the 6th of March 2023. Our dearest Sir Ernest slipped away quietly with his face beaming with smiles in the presence of his lovely wife Vivian, Son Ernest and Rev. Sister Liz, his younger sister.

He left behind his lovely wife, children, siblings and a host of relatives to mourn his passing. Kwabena Amoako, Even though losing you saddens us, we totally resign to the Will of God and take solace in His promise of eternal life.

You have played your part and exited quietly. May the Angels welcome you and lead you safely into paradise, into the arms of your creator whom you served so well. Adieu!

Rest well till we meet again.









wabena' as I affectionately called him has been my husband for forty-two solid and fruitful years. He has been my cherished friend, my dearest companion and my closest confidant. Today, I stand here in disbelief as I pay you this final tribute.

When we first met I least expected that we would become husband and wife. How the two of us came together as husband and wife can only be described as one of divine interventions; which became a reality through the skilful coordination of our biological mothers.

I was living in Accra with my eldest sister (Mrs Aiysa Kilba) and pursuing a course in fashion and dress making at Accra Girls vocational Institute, after my Middle School Leaving Certificate. My Sister whom I was living with was a nurse. She sent me to deliver some drugs to my sick mother at Adansi Akrofuom, my hometown. As fate would have it, that was when the journey of marriage caught up with me.

Ernest's Mum who happened to be my mother's friend paid her regular visits as a result of Mum being unwell. During my time at home, Maame (Ernest's Mum) saw me and made enquires about me from my Mum; and that was when Maame set her eyes on me and became interested in me. Her visit to our house became even more frequent and conversations with my mum went deeper into the night, and I sometimes wondered; what a good friend my

mother had. Just before my return to Accra, my mum disclosed that her friend (Maame), wanted to ask for my hand in marriage for his son. This was unexpected and got me totally confused. Ernest was by then teaching at Ghana Secondary School in Tamale, Some months later, I was sent back to Akrofuom to check on my Mum, and the pressure for marriage proposal came up again. But then my mother disclosed that the family had already agreed to her proposal. For the third time, I was called to Akrofuom on this same marriage issue, where I mastered courage and asked my mother "who does this in this day and age, arranging marriage for their grown up children?" My mother's response was not pleasant because that was exactly what was going to happen per the arrangements by the two families. I saw it as an infringement on my rights, but who was I to complain and to whom?

I later learnt that Ernest like myself also resisted the move by our two mothers, (may their beautiful souls rest in peace). He insisted he needed space and time to look out for his own future partner but his Mum wouldn't take no for an answer. When we finally met, Ernest subjected me to some lengthy interrogations. It was however, obvious from our subsequent interactions that we fell in love the very first time we met. The rest of our love story is history! Ernest was a very humble, simple and Godfearing and these qualities of his really appealed to me. By April 1981, all was set and the two families brought us together for our traditional marriage ceremony, which took place at

Akrofuom. The next day, we proceeded to Obuasi circuit court for registration through the Court Civil ordinance.

My husband had to leave me behind because he had relocated to Nigeria and needed time to settle properly and to plan for my arrival. It was in Nigeria we really began our marital journey. Ernest was employed as a full time teacher at Doherty Memorial Grammar School in Ejero, Ekiti State, and also engaged in other teaching tasks; whilst I committed myself to being a full-time housewife. We were blessed with our first two kids, Derek and Phyllis.



Ernest was very thoughtful and considerate. He was a man of his words and always fulfilled his promise. I remember him promised to buy me an electric sewing machine if I gave birth to a son as our first-born; this was borne out of the fact that he was the only son amongst six (6) daughters of his mother. Straight away he fulfilled the promise before I was discharged from the hospital.

I was born a Methodist whilst my husband was religiously Catholic. He did his best to convert me to Catholicism; and according to him, it was necessary we professed one faith to make the upbringing of our children in the faith uncomplicated for us. Ernest took it upon

himself to teach me catechism and instructed me in the Catholic faith. I have never wavered in the catholic faith, and have not regretted my conversion. Serving God and loving ones neighbour was central to Ernest's life.

Having spent five years in Nigeria, Kwabena decided it was time for us to return home, and so we packed back to Ghana. We first stayed briefly at Kumasi when Ernest got employed with UAC. He later moved to Lava Business Company, the head office in Accra shortly after. The family finally settled in Accra and lived happily thereafter for thirty-seven years until the inevitable happened.

It was at the Holy Spirit Cathedral in Accra that Ernest and I had our marriage blessed and received the sacrament of Holy Matrimony on 1st June 1991.

My husband joined the Knight of Marshal in April 1992 and introduced me to the fraternity in 1993. By God's grace, he rose through the ranks and became a Supreme Knight 2015. He saw this position as his special calling, a mission to serve humanity, which he executed so passionately. Ernest was a born leader and God blessed him with unique leadership skills. He made sure I accompanied him to various functions and everywhere a husband could take a wife both locally and internationally.

Kwabena was such a caring loving husband and father, and God knows I couldn't have asked for a better man. He was very protective of his family and provided all our needs. He ensured we were always comfortable and safe. Ernest accorded me so much respect and listened to my views on matters relating to our family. We were like brother and sister; we were always together and my friends were his friends and visa versa. Ernest taught me so much and tolerated my shortfalls. He was my teacher, prayer companion, accountant, counsellor, mentor and everything.

When our children grew up, he introduced me to international travels, to expose me to the world and to explore. He arranged with his niece Obaa Yaa Frimpong and her husband for me to visit them in the US. Within a short time all was set for me to travel to the United States. He provided me with everything I would need to ensure I'd be comfortable. Subsequently, he also guaranteed that I went on vacation at least once in every two years either with him or on my own. He travelled with me on his trips to the UK, Europe, Australia and the USA. These were special moments that enlightened me on different cultures and experiences.

Sir Ernest was elected as the Vice President of the International Alliance of Catholic Knights (IACK) in 2019, and as expected, I accompanied him for the conferment in the UK. The Church also honoured him with a Papal Award, which was climaxed in an investiture celebration on 10th December 2022. The occasion was so dear to his heart and brought him such inexpressible joy. He insisted on having a big party with close friends and family; little did I know it was his ultimate celebration. I never thought that was going to be the last celebration with my hero.

On the evening of Saturday, 4th March Kwabena felt unwell, and reported to Korle-Bu Teaching Hospital where he was admitted. On the 5th of March, we stayed with him all day at the hospital, and left around 9pm. He looked very well and told a lot of jokes all day.

When we all left his bedside, he called me back and said, "Vii, It is well, I feel much better today, and I'm sure I will be home tomorrow." He added, "You look very tired, please take care of yourself, and thanked me profusely which I felt was not necessary. The next day, the 6th of March, when I got to his bedside at the hospital he appeared feeble and had been put on oxygen. I held his hand and we prayed; I can virtually envisage the smile on his face. Kwabena, you took your last breath and slipped away quietly right before my eyes still wearing the beautiful smile and looking so peaceful.

Kwabena, we were all waiting and anxiously preparing to accompany you to Rome in September for your installation as the President at IACK, but that day was never to be; your maker called you to a higher installation and glory in heaven.



May God who called you Home welcome you into Paradise!

Rest well my dearest husband. I know and believe the Lord you served so faithfully, has rewarded you with eternal life. I pray we will meet again in heaven one day, never to part again.

Moda, his sweet girl became so close with Daa she could share virtually everything with him without the feelings of fear a child will usually feel towards the father. It isn't surprising that Daa, even when out of town for the weekend, still came home knowing everything that happened whilst he was away. Off course we all knew his "Sweet girl" was the one giving Daa all the scope even before he got out of his car. Mom who was sometimes amazed by the speed at which Moda did her kokonsa will usually look towards Moda and whisper "wo kokonsa dier, boi".

Dad's love for sweets is an open secret for those who really knew and spent time with him. Our father's fridge in his bedroom was always filled with everything sweet. It was in fact not a surprise to any of us when we opened Daa's fridge days after he had passed to still find a piece of chocolate in there. His fridge was our grocery store for chocolate and ice cream where we will usually go and "shop" when Daa was not home. Like magic, Daa will come home open his fridge and know someone has been in there. Moda, his sweet girl, is indeed a product of his father. Her love for everything sweet is a direct trait from Daa.

We will never forget when Daa took us to the Kwame Nkrumah mausoleum for an excursion on boxing day. On our way back home the fountains at the Kwame Nkrumah Circle were on full display for the Christmas season. Moda and I couldn't hide our admiration as the water

gushed out of the earth into the sky. Daa noticing how excited we were, gave us a brief description of what it was and told us it was called a "Water Fountain". He challenged us that whoever could remember the name when we get home will get extra Christmas candies. Moda and I spent the most part of the drive back home with "Water Fountain" on repeat until we fell asleep in the car. We made it home, got out of the car and we had both forgotten. Nothing could console Moda for the loss of those extra Christmas candies.

Oh! Dear, how we will miss your sense of humor, smile, and laughter. It was warm and contagious. Your sheer presence immediately brightened every room. Your way of making light of critical situations just to calm nerves was a thing of beauty and tact. We witnessed how effortless you resolved lots of family issues which we had all given up on. Conversations with you were never boring, they usually cut across all aspects of life, be it politics, sports, entertainment, religion etc. This will most often run deep into the night. Oh! Dear, Daa we will surely miss those moments. When people say Nana you have a great sense of humor, my usual response to them is "You have not met my Dad".

In our early years Daa worked so hard to provide us with everything we needed and wanted. We never lacked as kids. Because of his work at Lava, we had the best of everything. Be it the cool bicycles that made our friends jealous or the newest video games and dolls that made all the kids in the neighborhood wanting to come to our house. Dad's desire to provide for his young family kept him away from home most of the time in our early stages. Daa made up for the lost time in his later years. He will visit Moda and I in the States to spend some real quality time with us. Mom and Dad got stuck with us for 5 months in the States during the Covid lockdown. Prior to that none of us had ever been under the same roof as Dad, not having anywhere to go for more than a week. With all the negativity that Covid came with, mine was

a thing of joy and happiness. I woke up for the next 5 months with mom and dad next door. I got to know my dad very well, Daa got to know the man he has raised very well too. We went on walks and drives every day after work. Mom, Dad, Akosua, the kids and I would sit in front of the garage and chat for hours before retiring to bed. My dream when I first moved to the Sates was to have Daa visit so I can show him around Texas. I got to live this dream before Dad passed on to glory and I will say for this I am happy.

Education in our home was not an option. It was a must. Daa who began his career as an Educationist, teaching in Ghana Secondary School, Tamale. Had prominent personalities like President Mahama, Abedi Ayew (Abedi Pele) and many others as students in his Economics and Accounting classes. His teaching background influenced the non-negotiable education policy he held in our home. Everyone close to him, no matter what their ambitions and aspirations were, had to be learned. Daa pushed us beyond our limits. He encouraged us to leave our comfort zones and explore the different opportunities out there. Hence, our move to study and work abroad. Dad in his late 50's enrolled at GIMPA for an executive master's program, this he did to encourage everyone around him that it's never late to chase your dreams. Dad's hard-held stance on education did not only influence us, but the various testimonies also shared by almost every family member and people he mentored speak volumes of the kind of person he was. Daa our promise to you to get those doctorates degrees is still rife.

Daa, as you leave to take an eternal rest, please enjoy your sleep, and do not worry one second about your beautiful wife. We know how dear mom is to you and we are also aware of how you enjoyed spoiling her. Moda, Paa and I will take very good care of mom. We will spoil her to fulfill your glory and the glory of God. I know for sure you can trust us with this.

Daa, your sudden departure is just too hard to accept, our world is at a standstill. Our minds are blank. We did have a different plan for this very weekend which we have been working on for almost a year and there was nothing in the plan which states that we will be reading a tribute to you. Daa, it has always been our prayer and hope that the good Lord grants you and mom many years together so you could cross Rome off your bucket list of places to visit, but as it has always been the case our ways are not that of Gods. "... Here I am Lord, Is it I, Lord? I have heard You calling in the night. I will go Lord if You lead me. I will hold Your people in my heart ..."







t is with a heavy heart that we present this tribute in honour of our dear Sir Knight and Brother, Sir Ernest Amoako-Arhen, one of the Substantive Past Supreme Knights of the Noble Order of the Knights of Marshall.

Sir Ernest Amoako-Arhen was initiated into the Noble Order in the year 1992 at Council No. 10, Accra where he rose through the ranks to become Secretary of the Council.

He later transferred to Council 74 Accra Central when the Council was consecrated and became its first Grand Knight from the year 2000 to 2002.

Sir Ernest acquitted himself so well as the Grand Knight and Officer of the new Council that it did not take long for the Supreme Council, the Apex Governance Body of the Knights of Marshall, to recognize his sterling qualities and appointed him to its Standing Committee as the Supreme Secretary of Finance in 2009.

As the Secretary of Finance, he succeeded

in streamlining the accounts of the Supreme Council and the payment procedures of member Councils.

He also served on other Committees at the Supreme Council where he made significant contributions.

He will be remembered as a dedicated and hardworking Junior Organizer who showed concern for the spiritual and physical development of young Marshallans.

In 2013, Sir Kt. Amoako-Arhen, then Worthy Brother, was elected as the Deputy Supreme Knight and installed as the Supreme Knight of the Knights of Marshall in September 2015.

As the Supreme Knight, Sir Kt. Brother Sir Ernest Amoako-Arhen initiated far-reaching programmes that furthered the growth of the Noble Order. He worked with the Secretary of Finance, the late Sir Kt. Bro Deku to introduce simplified system of payment of levies to the Supreme Council by the constituent Councils.

A number of other important initiatives stand to his name. These include the following:

- Marshallan Savings and Investment Fund (MaSIF) which is aimed at bringing financial independence to Members of the Noble Order.
- The setting up of a Marshallan Rubber Plantation in the Tarkwa area aimed at improving the financial health of the Noble Order.
- Acquisition of lands in Tarkwa and Techiman for future construction of Montessori Schools in the name of Knights of Marshall.

Our dear Sir Ernest had a deep understanding of the tenets of the Noble Order and insisted on proper ways of approaching issues. He did not entertain any fears in expressing his opinion and ensuring that the right things were done.

Sir Ernest indeed paid his dues as a Knight and was seen as one of the effective and efficient Past Supreme Knights of the Noble Order.

It was for this reason that the Noble Order became proud and rejoiced with him when he was elected Deputy President of the International Alliance of Catholic Knights (IACK) which is an organization made up of fifteen (15) Roman Catholic fraternal Orders including the Knights of Marshall, with its Headquarters in Dublin, Ireland.

Like all Marshallans, Sir Ernest was a practicing Catholic and a stalwart of his Parish – the Holy Spirit Cathedral where, he once served as Chairman of the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC).

His contribution and sacrifices to the church were recognized by the Holy See which conferred on him the Papal Knighthood of St. Gregory the Great. Sir Ernest received his investiture along with others at a colourful ceremony on Saturday, 10th December 2022 at the Holy Spirit Cathedral, Accra, a little less than three (3) months before he was called by his Maker on 6th March 2023.

Sir Ernest would be sorely missed. We believe he would continue to shine in the Noble Order above.

Sir Kt. Bro. Sir Ernest Amoako-Arhen, rest in Perfect Peace in the bosom of God Almighty.





ir Knight Bro. Sir Ernest Amoako-Arhen was a foundation member of the Central Accra Region, following the split of the erstwhile Accra West Region into Central Accra Region and West Accra Region, consecrated simultaneously by the Supreme Council in September, 2000.

He played a big role in activities which led to the split of Accra West Region. Having now become a member of the new Central Accra Region, he threw his full weight, influence, and knowledge of the Constitution, Rituals, Procedures and Conventions of the Noble Order, behind it. He was regular at Regional Advisory Board meetings, Regional programs and other activities of the Region. As part of this support, he invited the leadership of the Region occasionally to advise and share his thoughts.

He had the strong conviction that the Noble Order (and by extension the Catholic Church) can grow only if new Councils and Courts are consecrated. And so he championed the consecration of new Councils and Courts including those in Abeka (Council 127 and Court 121), Kaneshie (Council 172 and Court 152) and in the erstwhile Accra West.

He held many positions in the Noble Order, and was a Regional Secretary of Finance in the erstwhile Greater Accra Regional Council.

Sir Knight Bro Sir Amoako-Arhen, was a very capable Installation Officer and was fond of installations. He tried to make every installation unique with a selection of new songs and a commentary which brought out the full significance of the event. He admonished Grand Knights that their positions were a call to sacred duty, good interpersonal relations, strict adherence to the admonitions of the Noble Order. They were required to bear the full responsibilities of their offices.

Already a Substantive Past Supreme Knight (SPSK), he was elected and installed Vice President of the International Alliance of Catholic Knights (IACK), in 2011 for a two-year tenure; which was expected to end this year. In anticipation of his elevation and instillation as President of IACK, in September 2023, Central

Accra Region had lived in joyful expectation. Sadly, the expectations have been cut short. Man indeed proposes and God disposes.

In November, 2022, Sir Knight, together with 13 other Catholics, received the Papal Awards. He was honoured "Knight of Saint Gregory the Great" the Great. It was a proud moment for the Region, which was well attended and celebrated.

Strangely, the health of Sir Knight Bro. Sir Amoako-Arhen, who was known to be healthy and active, began to dip in January this year. He skipped the January Advisory Board and Council meetings.

He himself is reported to have told close friends about his poor health and an appointment with the doctor.

He seemed to have made good recovery, as friends who visited him, at home, reported. The recovery didn't last long, and on Monday 6th March, the sad news hit everybody. Sir Knight Bro. Sir Ernest Kwabena Amoako-Arhen, had died at the Korle Bu Teaching hospital. What was thought to be another visit to the doctor suddenly turned out to be his last, a sudden and unexpected departure which has brought pain, anguish and tears.

We in the Region, have been left with memories of a gem, a man of courage, knowledge and influence. It is difficult not to feel the pain. We however look back with gratitude, on the inspiration which many received from him, his faith and courage, lived as a great Catholic Christian Knight; and indeed a good Marshallan. He have no doubt that he is in peaceful rest.

Central Accra, indeed, believes that our late Sir Knight Brother, has written his own tribute in the words of one of his favourite songs "I the Lord of Sea and Sky".

Central Accra Region joins our Brothers and Sisters of the Marshallan Fraternity all over the world, to mourn with the widow, Most Respected Lady (MRL), Sis Vivian Amoako-Arhen, his children, siblings and indeed the entire family.

With hope in God and the resurrection, we bid our beloved Sir Knight Brother Ernest Kwabena Amoako-Arhen farewell, in the words of Catholic Hymnal 351:(vrs. 4):

"So long they Power has Blessed me, sure it still will lead me on.

O'er moor and fen, O'er crag and torrent till the night is gone

And with the morn those angels faces smile. Which I have loved, long since and lost awhile"


Though we are saddened by your demise, we strongly believe that the life just ended marks the beginning of a better one in heaven.

THE NOBLE ORDER OF THE KNIGHTS AND LADIES OF MARSHALL, COUNCIL 74 AND COURT 67, ACCRA-CENTRAL

he news of the passing into eternity of the very distinguished Marshallan, Sir Kt. Bro. Sir Ernest Amoako Arhen, provoked spontaneous messages of shock, disbelieve, and sadness, by his colleague Brothers of Council No 74 on the WhatsApp Platform of the Council, with the consolation of their Sisters of Court No 67: "Oh what a shock", "What a tragedy for the entire Marshallan Fraternity", "An irreplaceable colossus of the Noble Order has fallen", etc. Such was the outpouring of grief by all Brothers and Sisters of Accra-Central, who, unexpectedly, heard of the passing on of a man, who had been seen by many, hale and hearty, not long before he passed on.

But, despite the exclamations of shock and dismay, Scripture, offers us some sort of consoling words under such sad situations, some as follows: "Good people die, and no one understands, or even cares. But when they die no calamity can hurt them. Those who live good lives find peace and rest in death" (Isaiah 57: 1-2). Furthermore, Scripture continues, "My thoughts,' says the LORD, 'are not like yours, and my ways are different from yours" (Isaiah 55:8).

So let us render unto Caesar what is due unto Caesar, and unto God what is due unto God.

Then, Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen, was initiated into the Noble Order of the Knights of Marshall in September 1991, at his Mother Council No 10, Accra, and after going through the Preliminary Course of Study of the Order, he was admitted into full Marshallan Knighthood at the 9th Degree. He, then undertook the Lower Degree Course of the Order, and successfully passed the prescribed Examination in June 1993, next proceeding to the study of the Mystics Psychology Course of the Noble Order, which he completed in November 1994.

Having demonstrated early initiative and talent, Bro. Ernest Amoao-Arhen was appointed Assistant Secretary of his Council, from January 1996 to December 1998, and substantive Secretary from January 1999 to November 2000. In the meantime, he served as the Reporter of Council No 10 from January 1997 to December 1997, served on the Welfare Committee from January 1998 to December 1998, and concurrently served during the above period on the Business Committee, and the

Finance Committee of Council No 10. He had also served as an Organizer of the Junior Order of his Council over a seven-year period from January 1993 to November 2000.



During the year 2000, Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen, teamed up with a group of like-minded Brothers of his Council No 10, to canvass for the formation of a new Council at the Holy Spirit Cathedral, Adabrake, Accra. This new Council No 74, his present Council, was indeed consecrated on 25th November, 2000, with Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen, being listed on the Consecration Charter of the New Council, as one of the Fifty-Six Founding Members, and more importantly, being elected to the position of First Grand Knight, the Chief Executive Officer of the New Council, for his recognized diligence, initiative, and leadership qualities, serving Two Years on the throne as Grand Knight, until 2002.

After serving his tenure as Grand Knight, Bro. Amoako-Arhen did not rest on his oars, and contributed immensely to the development of the Noble Order by serving in several other capacities. From January 2003 to August 2005, he served as the Regional Welfare officer of the erstwhile Greater Accra Regional Council. The high performance rate of Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen did not go unnoticed by the Supreme Council, the highest Administrative Body of the Knights of Marshall. Thus, in the year 2003, Bro. Amoako-Arhen was appointed unto the Standing Committee of the Supreme Council, as Supreme Auditor, a position he held for

four years, until 2007. Meanwhile, Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen had been elevated in rank in the year 2004 from the position of Past Grand Adviser (PGA), to the rank of Past Regional Grand Knight (PRGK), with the Heraldic Title of "WORTHY BROTHER". After completion of his term as Supreme Auditor in 2007, Worthy Brother Amoako-Arhen was appointed as the Supreme Secretary of Finance, serving over a seven-year period from 2007 to 2013. Still in progression, W/Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen was elected in 2013 as the Deputy Supreme Knight of the Knights of Marshall, over a twoyear period, until 2015, when he ascended to the pinnacle of power of the Knights of Marshall, as the 31ST Substantive Supreme Knight, with the Heraldic Title of, "SIR KNIGHT", to serve a two-year tenure, superintending over Marshallan Councils in Eight (8) Countries in the West African Sub-Region, and in the United Kingdom.

Sir Kt. Bro Ernest Amoako-Arhen was a deep thinker. During his Inaugural Address at his installation as Supreme Knight at the Marshallan Temple, Sekondi, on 29th August, 2015, Sir Kt. Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen made a rallying call to members of the Noble Order to help diversify the revenue sources of the Noble Order, to meet the changing needs of the times. In line with that, he proposed the setting up of a Microfinance Company, to be known as the Fraternity Micro Finance Company Limited, to contribute to the reduction of poverty in the country, by providing financial services to the needy business Institutions, and individuals. He also proposed the establishment of the St. Anthony Montessori Schools Complex at various parts of the Country, to start from Pre-School, through Basic School, to the Senior High School Level, as part of processes to impart knowledge, and develop the powers of reasoning and judgment of students. Sir kt. Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen, further proposed the setting up of a Rubber Plantation at Tarkwa to generate some income for the Noble Order.

The progression of Sir Kt. Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen in the Fraternal Order did not end with his tenure as Past Substantive Supreme Knight of the Knights of Marshall. In the year 2019, Sir Kt. Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen, was elected as the Vice-President of the International Alliance of Catholic Knights (IACK), an Organization of Fifteen (15), International, Catholic, Kindred Orders with similar objectives, and organizational features in common. Sir Kt. Bro. Amoako-Arhen should have been installed as the Substantive President of IACK in the year 2021, but this suffered periodic reschedule, because of the COVID outbreak, until the installation was definitely confirmed to take place in Rome in September this year, 2023. But Man proposes, and God disposes, making it impossible for his installation to come off in his life time.

Sir Kt. Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen, worked very hard to earn his unchallenged recognition as a very distinguished member of the Noble Order of the Knights of Marshall. But he worked even harder on his faith, to also earn a very rich Curriculum Vitae, in his service to the Holy Mother, the Catholic Church, having served in the following capacities at his Parish, the Holy Spirit Cathedral, Adabraka, Accra, over several years:

i.

Sir Kt. Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen was a Board Member of the Millenium House Complex Project of the Holy Spirit Cathedral, and was Chairman of the Millelium House Fundraising Project.

ii.

He was Chairman of the Holy Spirit Cathedral Golden Jubilee Planning Committee.

iii.

He was Public Relation Officer of the Parish Pastoral Council from the year 2003 to 2004.

iv.

He was Vice-Chairman of the Parish Pastoral

Council over a four-year period in the years 2005, 2006, 2007 and 2008.

v.

He, then, became the Substantive Chairman of the Parish Pastoral Council over a four-year period in the years 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2012

vi.

Concurrently, in serving in the above capacities at the Holy Spirit Cathedral, Sir Kt. Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen was Patron of the following Societies at the Holy Spirit Cathedral: The HSC Main Choir, the St. Theresa of the Child Jesus Society, the St. Augustine's Society, and the H.S.C. Youth Choir.

Sir. Kt. Bro. Ernest Amoako-Arhen demonstrated a charitable spirit at the Holy Spirit Cathedral, donating a full complement of Choir Robes to the Holy Spirit Cathedral Choir, and supporting some youth of the Parish to various Tertiary Institutions. No wonder, for his Dedication, Commitment, and Selflessness, he was awarded a Certificate of Honour at the 125th Anniversary of the Archdiocese of Accra, by the Archbishop.

But the icing on the cake towards his honour, occurred on 10th December, 2022, when the Papal Award of St. Gregory the Great was bestowed on him, at an Installation Ceremony at the Holy Spirit Cathedral, in recognition of his immense contribution to the Holy Mother, the Catholic Church, and to humanity. This Award earned him an additional "SIR" Title, thus in addition to the "Marshallan Title", becoming, "Sir Kt. Bro. Sir Ernest Amoako-Arhen". For his life accomplishments, we can only make reference to him in terms of the wise saying of Henry Wadsworth:

"When a great man dies, for years, the light he leaves behind him, lies on the paths of men." The Marshallan Fraternity has, indeed, lost an accomplished Marshallan, an encyclopedia of Marshallan rituals, who could instantly offer any explanation on any aspect of Marshallan

rituals and Activities, down to earth with the grassroots of the membership of his Council No 74, attending all Council No 74 Meetings, including Committee Meetings, whenever available, and ready to help every member out of any problem. Council No 74, and Court No 67, indeed, the Noble Order of the Knights and Lades of Marshall, have lost a Gem, and it is with very heavy hearts that We, The Marshallan Fraternity of Accra-Central, bid farewell to our fallen leader. But as Marshallans, we take Consolation in our belief that, the life of our Sir Kt. Bro Sir Ernest Amoako-Arhen, just ended, marks the beginning for him of a richer and immortal life in the Noble Order Above, in the LORD'S Kingdom. Indeed, Jesus said to him: "I promise you, that today you will be in Paradise with me" (Luke 23:43).



Sir Amoako-Arhen's generosity and kindness were evident in his support of numerous societies in the church, including the Cathedral Choir, to whom he donated a full complement of choir robes in 2015, St. Theresa of the Child Jesus Society, St. Augustine's Society, and the Youth Choir. He was also known for his support of young people, providing financial assistance to some youth of the church to attend various tertiary institutions.

Sir Amoako-Arhen's dedication to serving the church did not go unnoticed, as he was conferred with the title of Papal Knight of the Order of St. Gregory the Great, for his distinguished personal character and reputation and for his conscious service to the Church and Society, in December 2022. Prior to this, he was

awarded a Certificate of Honour during the 125th Anniversary of the Archdiocese of Accra. His service to the church was a reflection of his deep faith and his commitment to living out the values of the gospel.

As we bid farewell to Sir Ernest Amoako-Arhen, we take comfort in the knowledge that he lived a life of faithful service to God and his community. His legacy of selflessness, generosity, and devotion to the work of the church will continue to inspire and guide us in the years to come.

Lawrence Mensah's time he donated sets of robes for the Altar Servers, and bought a good number of Hymn Books for the church choir, as a way of motivating them to sing Catholic traditional hymns and psalms. Sir Knight Ernest Amoako-Arhen was very instrumental in liaising with Catholics from Adansi Akrofuom who were resident in Accra and Tema to do things to support the local church.

On some occasion, when Sir Knight was made the Chairman for the Annual Harvest of St Luke Catholic Church, he encouraged as many of the Akrofoum citizens in diaspora as possible to participate and contribute their widow's mite towards the harvest. Sometimes he even brought friends from Accra who were non-natives. He was a guardian to our church.

About two years ago, Sir Knight contacted Bishop John Afoakwa (Catholic Bishop of Obuasi) and the Parish Priest to give him a site to build Our Lady's Grotto on the Catholic Church premises in memory of his mother, for the church in Akrofuom. His hope was that, it would offer our Catholic members the opportunity to pray and seek for our mother Mary's intercession in their daily lives. Unfortunately, death laid its icy hand on him before he could inaugurate it. This is sad!

The entire congregation of St. Luke Catholic Church prays that God will give him a peaceful rest till we meet again in heaven. May his soul and the souls of all the faithful departed rest in Perfect Peace

Tribute to a very distinguished and iconic gentleman of ROSCO/FIASSEC Old Students Association (ROFOSA). The entire ROSCO/FIASSEC Old Students Association was thrown into a state of shock when the news was broken to us that our First National President had kicked the bucket. The untimely death of the Late Royal Mr. Ernest Amoako-Arhen has robbed the Association of one of its humble, tolerant, and inspiring members.

("Royal" is a title given to every past student of ROSCO/FIASSEC).

The Late Royal Ernest Amoako-Arhen entered Royal Secretarial College (ROSCO) in 1969 in Tarkwa for his secondary education. (ROSCO later was renamed Royal Secondary Commercial School when it became a Government-assisted school, and now is called Fiaseman Senior Secondary School). He completed ROSCO in 1974.

He, together with some dedicated Old Students, spearheaded the formation of ROSCO/FIASSEC Old Students Association (ROFOSA). The Late Royal Ernest Amoako-Arhen was elected the first Branch President of the Accra/Tema Old Students Association. He was later elected the first National President. His vision was to bring together and mobilize most of the Old Students in the country under one umbrella. Thus, to give effect to this vision, under his able and capable leadership supported by his executives, he ensured that the Association formed branches in Accra/Tema, Sekondi/ Takoradi, Tarkwa and Kumasi. As part of organizing the branches, he led his executives to attend National Council Meetings in either Takoradi or Tarkwa or Kumasi. It would be recalled that on one of such trips from Kumasi, one of his executive members who was driving indicated that he was tired and that they should stop by a town and look for accommodation to rest. Our late National President who was alert throughout the journey, took over the steering

wheel of the vehicle and drove the team until they got closer to Accra. His reason was that he was a team player and burden-bearer; one ought to be ready at all times to offer a helping hand to a friend who was tired and in need of assistance. Such was the man who now lies motionless before us!

The Late Royal Ernest Amoako-Arhen's commitment to the ideals of the Association and progress of his alma mater knew no bounds. In fact, he put service before self and provided leadership. 
improvement we see in the livelihood of both the poor and the vulnerable across Akrofuom Traditional Area.

"Albert, how are you today? Please take good care of yourself. Don't appear in public until you are fully recovered. Be careful with what you eat. Tell Ofori (Worthy Bro Emmanuel Ofori-Dankwah) I asked of him. Tell him my phone will be off so he shouldn't worry if he is not getting through to me." I did not know these were his final words to me on March 3, 2023 when he called to check on me. Since I fell sick, he and his wife, Most Respected Lady Sis Vivian Amoako-Arhen have visited me a couple of times but the calls were frequent – sometimes four times in a day just to check on me.

Our personal relationship started when he invited me to join his installation planning committee under the leadership of the late Sir Kt Bro Andrew Nukpeh. At the time I joined the committee, the committee had virtually done its work. He then tasked Ofori-Dankwah and myself to review the work and make recommendations where necessary. After that,

he virtually handed over the implementation work to Sir Kt Bro Nukpeh, Ofori -Dankwah and my good self. At times, we clashed with him because he wanted some things to be done in a particular way which we resisted. "You people are strong ooo. It is my installation and yet you are dictating things for me," I recall him saying to us. But in the end, he was so excited with the outcome and we became closer thereafter.

You came to our lives, for a little while. You left footprints on our hearts and we will never be same. The debt owned by us to you is immeasurable and inexpressible.

Sir Kt Bro Sir Ernest Amoako-Arhen was a simple, a strong man, straightforward but often misunderstood person. He was often misunderstood because he believes in principles and insist on the right things being done.

You spent a great deal of your life on earth impacting and investing in the lives of other

people. You knew you had a gift and didn't hoard it but like a grain of wheat, you sowed it in the lives of others. We are all witnesses to just how much fruit your noble investment has yielded. We mourn your passing but we know with absolute certainty that heaven is clapping to receive you.

He was someone who believed in self-sufficiency and not depending on levies to run the Church or the Noble Order. That led him to moot and start the rubber plantation project for the Noble Order.

He also led the Holy Spirit Cathedral Parish to put up what was supposed to be a guest house for visiting Catholics to the Archdiocese to serve as income generating venture. But it was converted to offices. He also went to the Techiman Diocese to negotiate for a release of land for a school project. This was something he wanted all Regional Councils and Courts to take up to as income generating projects.

Sadly, as he joins the Noble Order above, the first harvesting from the rubber plantation is expected to take off this month. This reinforces his conviction that the project was not his personal property but for the benefit of the Noble Order.

Sir Ernest was nicknamed the Marshall Inspector General of Police (IGP) simply because each time he saw something wrong, he stood his grounds that it must be corrected,





often attracting criticisms for not allowing the wrongs to be corrected later. He was very strict, a trait he said he learnt from Sir Kt Bro Sir James Augustine Adomako, popularly known as Sir James, the metuselar of the Noble Order. He believed in the youth and would do anything possible to support the youth of the Noble Order and at church to rise to the top.

He loved the Noble Order and believed in its rituals. He had always acknowledged the depth of knowledge of the rituals by the late Sir Kt Bro D. D. Domfeh and Sir Kt Bro Tony Baffour. To him, Sir Kt Bro Tony Baffour should have been a permanent member of the Standing Committee and Supreme Council because 'he understands the rituals and explains them better to everyone's understanding'.

Sir Amoako-Arhen, many people, found in you a father, confidante and an adviser. You were prepared to listen to anybody who cared to talked to you, regardless of age, or gender. But it pleased the Lord to call you home because your work here on earth is done, and absent in the body is present with the Lord [2 Cor 5:8]

Indeed, I am sure that heaven has gained a gem. The path you have laid down is one worth emulating. I have no doubt you served your generation; you fulfilled your calling and did your Master's will.




